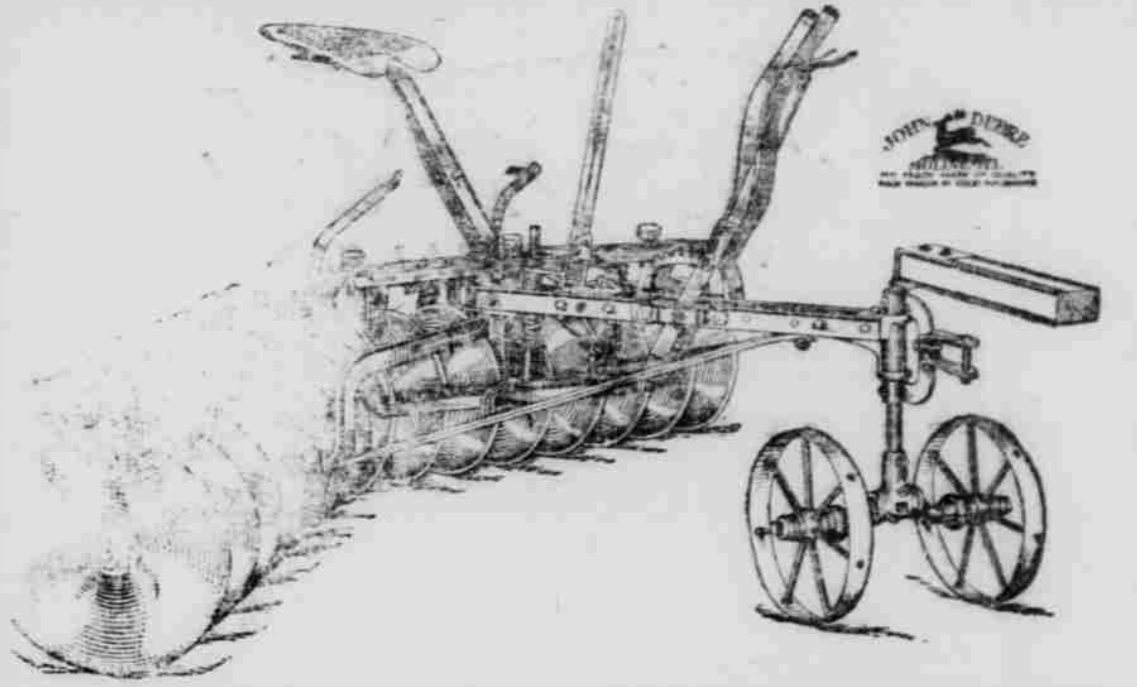

WILL TRY TO OUST STONE AS CHAIRMAN

Members of Own Party to Disregard Senate Seniority Rule—Hitchcock is in Line.

Washington, D. C., March 7.—A fight against re-electing William J. Stone to the chairmanship of the foreign relations committee will be made by members of his own party despite the seniority rule that has prevailed in such matters, according to a prominent democrat, who was one of the leaders in the fight to pass the armed neutrality measure.

The new senate cannot proceed to business until committees and chairmanships have been selected.

Senate Committee Continued.

Senator Kern, however, last Friday presented a resolution which was adopted, continuing the senate committee of the sixty-fourth congress during the present special session of the senate.

Senator Owen yesterday held that inasmuch as the sixty-fourth congress died Sunday, they could not in any way govern or even suggest rules for the new senate.

Owen pointed out that the sixteen new members had every right to demand a say.
