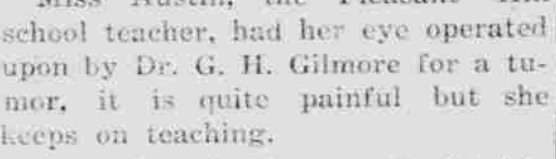

INSPECTED BAD PLACE ON THE ROCK BLUFFS ROAD
State Engineer Johnson, County Commissioner Fitz and County Attorney A. G. Cole yesterday afternoon were out inspecting a bad place on the Rock Bluffs road near the farm of Major Hall to determine just what would be the best means of dealing with the proposition. A deep ditch has been worn by washing which crosses the roadway twice in a short distance of each other and has formed quite a ditch on the land of Mr. Hall. It has been thought that if a small ditch was constructed on the opposite side of the roadway that it might result in the country being able to check further washing of the old ditch and permit of its being filled up and save further cost to the county. The state engineer viewed the washout ditch and will assist the county board in arriving at some solution that will allow them to stop further washing away of the road and the adjoining land.
