## AUTO CRASHES INTO COAL WAGON ON PEARL STREET

Last evening after 9 o'clock quite a serious accident occurred on Pearl street near the Bauer garage, when the large super-six Hudson automobile owned by William Puls of Murray crashed into the horse and wagon belonging to William R. Egenberger, the coal dealer. The car had just swung around the corner into Pearl street when the accident occurred and before the machine could be stopped when it was seen that the wagon was in the path of the machine the crash came. The horse which was hitched to the wagon was badly injured, having the bone in one of the front legs of the animal badly shattered and the shoulder of the animal was also badly injured, making it a serious matter whether or not the horse will be fit for use in the future. The wagon was also badly mangled up and damaged and in the opinion of the owner it will not be able to again be used, but will be relegated to the scrap heap and have to be replaced with a new wagon. The driver, Dick Simpson, was thrown from the wagon to the pavement, and suffered a severe shaking up, as well as being badly bruised up, although it is not thought that the injuries will prove dangerous. The car was occupied by a number of ladies, Miss Laura Puls, Mrs. W. H. Puls and little son, Mrs. L. H. Puls, Miss Philpot and Miss Engelkemier, all of Murray, and the members of the party received a very severe fright in the accident, although none were injured. The automobile was quite large and heavy and was not badly damaged by the wreck.

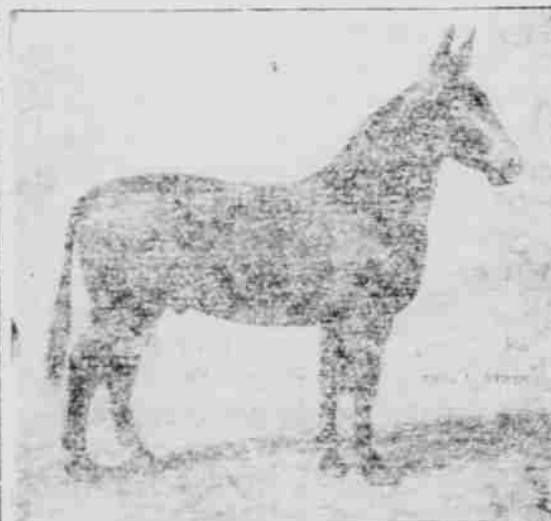
