CITY MANAGER
BILL PASSED
BY SENATE

Constitutional Amendment to Reduce Size of Legislature Goes Through—Four Election Measures.

Lincoln, Neb., April 4.—The senate Tuesday passed the McMullen city manager bill, applying to all cities over 1,000 population, excepting Omaha, the bill eliminating names of presidential electors from the ballot and the bill to submit a constitutional amendment reducing the size of the legislature. The bills passed were:

S. F. No. 318—Gives constables sheriffs' powers in serving processes.

S. F. No. 288—City manager plan for cities of more than 1,000.

S. F. No. 142—Re-establishes supreme court commission with three stenographers, at \$1,000 a year each.

S. F. No. 287—Amends Torrens land registration act.

S. F. No. 140—Provides for non-partisan election of school superintendent in counties and state.

S. F. No. 320—Raises salary of state veterinarian from \$2,400 to \$3,000 a year.

S. F. No. 321—Requires annual publication of county personal tax lists.

S. F. No. 300—Provides for road work by convicts.

S. F. No. 99—Constitutional amendment reducing senate to sixteen members and house to fifty members, to serve four years each and receive \$1,000 salary.

S. F. No. 212—Increases per diem allowance for county boards in small counties.

S. F. No. 203—Provides that misrepresentation must be material to the risk to invalidate an insurance policy.

S. F. No. 122—Permanent employees and pension bill for city of Omaha.

S. F. No. 181—Constitutional amendment providing four-year term for county judges.

S. F. No. 308—Provides that voting sources shall be placed on left of initiative and referendum questions on ballot.

S. F. No. 322—Provides separate ballot boxes for ballots on constitutional amendments.

H. R. No. 193—Eliminates names of presidential electors from ballot.

WAR BALLOON ATTRACTS ATTENTION.

This morning the appearance of a war balloon in the sky in the east caused a great deal of excitement among the residents of the city, who gathered in the street to watch the air craft as it moved along on its course, but being several miles away it was not possible to distinguish much of the balloon. This was one of the observation balloons sent up by the United States government signal corps from Fort Omaha to get in practice for the work in the war, should necessity require it. The balloon was in sight for over an hour before it disappeared in the southeast.

SAYS NORRIS'
WORDS ARE NEAR
TO TREASON

Nebraska Senator Rebuked for Defense of Germany During Speech.

“Tries to Put Kaiser's Picture on United States Flag,” Declares James.

Washington, D. C., April 4.—“While I am most emphatically and sincerely opposed to taking any step that will force our country into the useless and senseless war now being waged in Europe,” said Senator Norris, speaking against the war resolution in the senate today, “yet if this resolution passes, I shall not let my feelings of opposition to its passage interfere in any way with my duty, as a senator or as a citizen in bringing success and victory to American arms. I am bitterly opposed to my country entering the war, but if, notwithstanding my opposition, we do enter it, all of my energy and all of my power will be behind our flag in carrying it to victory.”

U-Boats Better Than English Mines.

Senator Norris said that the beginning of trouble lay in the two blockade orders issued by Germany and England early in the war. He declared the United States had largely acquiesced in the English order, although, he said, if there was any choice between English floating mines and German submarines it lay in favor of the submarines, which can exercise some discretion in attacking. He asserted that an embargo on the shipment of supplies from this country would have broken both blockades.

“England would have been compelled to take her mines out of the North sea in order to get any supplies from our country,” said Norris.

“When her mines were taken out of the North sea, then the German ports upon the North sea would have been accessible to American shipping and Germany would have been compelled to cease her submarine warfare in order to get any supplies from our nation into German North sea ports.”

Says U. S. Was Not Neutral. He asserted that the United States should have pursued a course of strict neutrality and that had this been done this country would not now be on the verge of war.

“I have no quarrel with the man who does not desire our country to remain neutral,” he said. “While many people are moved by selfish motives and hopes of gain, I have no doubt that in a great many instances, through what we believe to be a misunderstanding of the real conditions, there are many honest patriotic citizens who think we ought to engage in the war and who are behind the president in his demand that we should declare war against Germany. I think such people err in judgment and to a great extent have been misled as to the real history and the true facts by the almost unanimous demand of the great combination of wealth that has a direct financial interest in our participation in the war.”

War is Wealth's Mandate. “Enormous loans to the allies,” he said, “have been instrumental in bringing about a public sentiment in favor of our country taking a course that would make every bond worth 100 cents on the dollar and making the payment of every debt certain and sure.”

Norris declared that Wall street was demanding war “and that, we are going into war upon the command of gold. We are about to do the bidding of wealth's mandate. I feel that we are about to put the dollar sign upon the American flag.”

This statement produced profound excitement and was promptly challenged. Norris said he intended to reflect on no one.

Mrs. J. A. Shaffer started for North Platte to attend a Yeoman state meeting last week, and will stop at Tastings and Sutton on her return trip home.

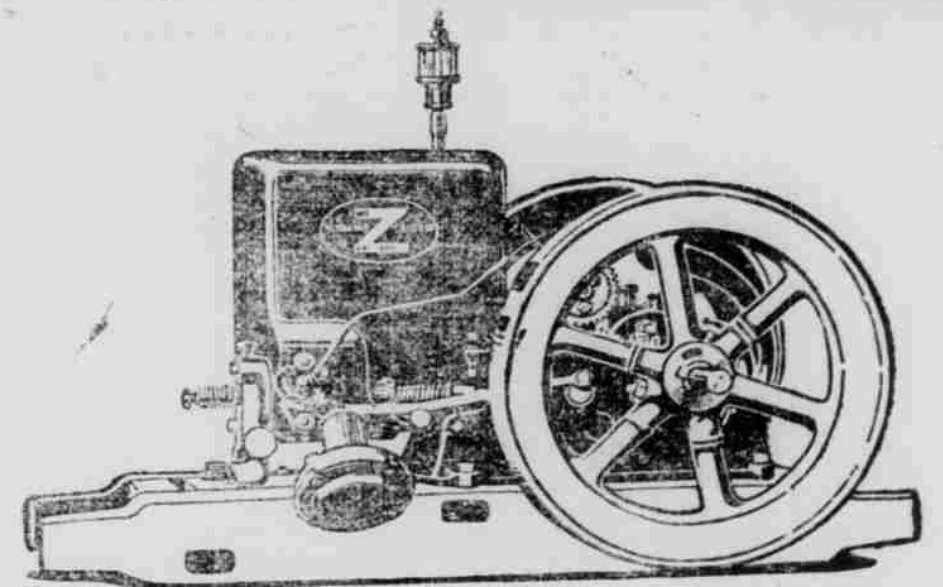
