

FROM PERU NORMAL.

The members of the post-graduate class are to be entertained by the faculty on Friday evening.

The intercollegiate debate schedule has been arranged to take place as follows: Midland college at Peru, April 23; Deane college at Peru, April 26; Greeley Normal school at Greeley, Colo., and also at Peru, May 11.

Considerable damage was done to the normal training building last Tuesday evening by a fire, which started in the kiln. The fire might well have been very disastrous had it not been for the prompt work of the normal students, as well as the city fire team.

The Science club was very fortunate in hearing Prof. Britzell of Wayne Normal, Friday evening, in a lecture on "Wireless Telegraphy." A number of young men from Peru and vicinity have recently enlisted in the National Guard. A company has been organized for military drill and is now working under the direction of Prof. C. E. Beck.
