MILUKOFF QUITS

Provisional Government Unwilling to Admit Soldiers' and Workmen's Element.

Petrograd, May 16.—Paul N. Milukoff, minister of foreign affairs, has resigned, leaving the cabinet altogether.

M. Tereschetenko, minister of finance, has been appointed foreign minister, and A. F. Kerensky, previously minister of justice, has been named minister of war and marine.

Having discussed the conditions under which representatives of the council of workmen's and sailors' delegates would consent to enter the decided today that it was unable to acdecidd today that it was unable to accept the first of these conditions. This called for the enunciation as a fundamental principle of a foreign policy openly pursuing the aim of reaching as soon as possible a general peace without annexations of indemnities, on the basis of the right of nations to work out their destinies

The provisional government was unable to agree to such a principle because it did not consider possible any renunciation of principles set forth in its proclamation of April 9 The provisional government thinks it necessary to confirm the unity of all allied fronts and insists on an energetic struggle against anarchy. To the financial and economic reforms mentioned in the council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates the govevnment raises no objections, regarding it as part of its task to realize


