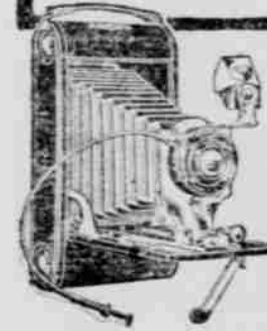

## GRAND ARMY MEETS IN ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT

Assemblies at Columbus With Five Other Patriotic Societies in Joint Session.

Prominent Officials Present—Hot Race Expected for Department Commander.

Columbus, Neb., May 16.—Members of the Grand Army of the Republic, Nebraska department, gathered here today to begin their forty-first annual encampment, meeting in conjunction with the United Spanish-American War Veterans, who are holding their tenth annual encampment. The sessions are to continue until Friday night.

In view of present national conditions, the encampments this year have attracted more veterans than hitherto, and the three days' program is crowded with speeches, drilling exhibitions by the local members of the Boy Scouts, and "camp fire" talks by the veterans. If the weather permits the encampment will conclude with a military drill by all members present who will show "how they did it in '61 and '68."

The speakers for the sessions have been chosen from men well known by the soldiers. Commander-in-chief General William J. Patterson of Pittsburgh, Pa., has accepted an invitation to address the veterans tomorrow. Governor Neville will be here Thursday night, as will Chief Justice Morrissey, who is a veteran soldier. Other speakers include: W. H. Stewart, department commander of the Grand Army of the Republic; Colonel John G. Maher, department commander of the United Spanish-American War Veterans; W. T. Church of Chicago, and Mrs. Ida K. Martin, national vice president of the Woman's Relief corps, of Minneapolis. Mrs. Martin will be the guest of the corps at Omaha the next of the week.

A spirited contest is expected in the race for department commander, candidates for which office are Colonel Wilson E. Majors of Peru and J. S. Hoagland of North Platte. Both men are prominent in Grand Army circles, and each has a large following.

Today's session is to be given over entirely to the reception of visitors. A large delegation came up from Omaha this morning.

Washington, May 16.—Members of legislation to stop speculation in committees today reported to their colleagues that President Wilson is unusually anxious for early passage of legislation to stop speculation in foods and regulate production and distribution. The food situation ranks second only to the army and navy in importance for the war, the president told the committee members at a White House conference last night.

It seemed probable today that all food legislation pending in congress will be re-arranged in three administration bills—one providing for a food survey and stimulating production, already under consideration in the senate; another regulating distribution and prices; and the third authorizing a system of preferential shipments.

Attorney General Gregory today discussed phases of the federal investigation into high food prices with Robert W. Childs and George W. Anderson, special assistants in charge of the inquiry.
