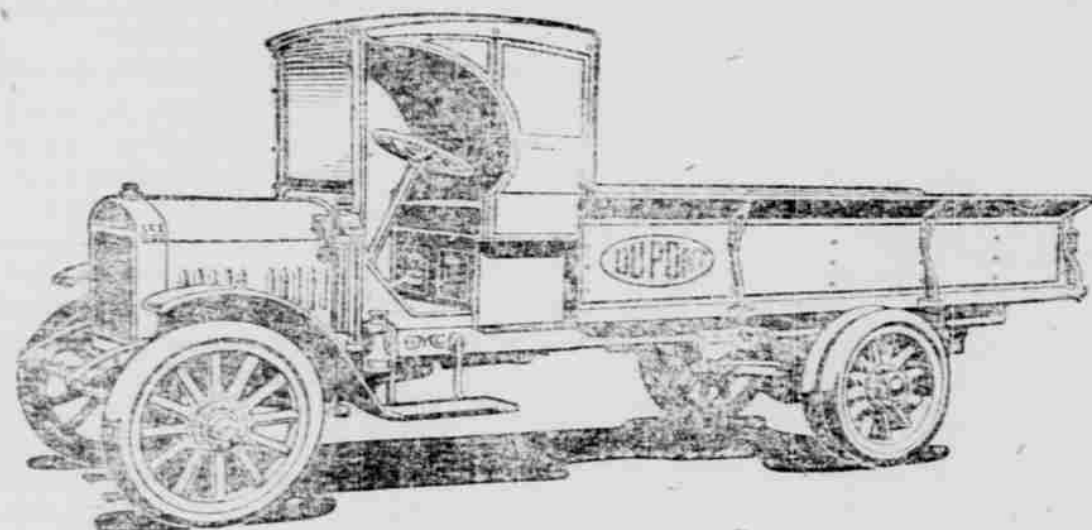

C., May 23.—Construction and operation of a great fleet of barges to move grain down the Mississippi river to tidewater and thus relieve railway congestion, is being considered by President Wilson. 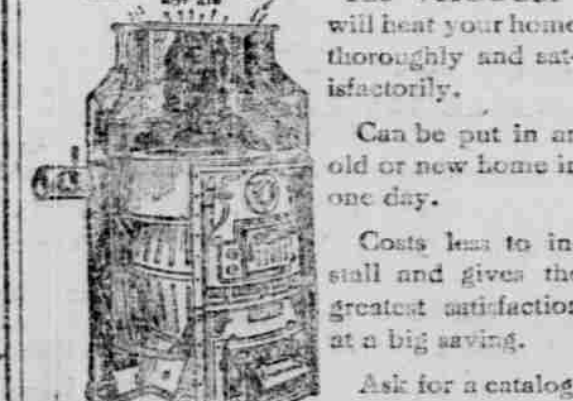
