GOVERNMENT GRATIFIED BY RESPONSE OF U. S. YOUTHS

Washington, D. C., June 6.—Registration day developments were summarized by the committee on public information tonight in the following statement:

"Nearly 10,000,000 Americans of military age registered today for service in the army against Germany. The registration was accomplished in a fashion measuring up to the highest standards of Americanism.

"The young men came to the registration places enthusiastic; there was hint of slacking spirit anywhere except in a few cases where misguided persons had been prevailed upon to attempt to avoid their national obligation.

"The government officials, who had professed the highest confidence in the patriotism of the young men of the nation were deeply gratified over the result; it transcended their highest expectations.

"From every state reports were received showing that the sporadic attempt to thwart the first step toward the mobilization of as large an army as the country may need to bring the war to a victorious conclusion had failed utterly. The department of justice had tremendous machinery ready to cope with these conspiracies, but it proved to be unnecessary.

"Late this afternoon the department had not received a report of a single arrest, and the only opposition reported to any governmental body occurred in Virginia, where one man who denounced the government and the flag was promptly taken into custody.

"Arrangements had been made by the department of justice and the war department to secure immediate telegraphic reports upon the outbreak of troublesome occurrences. The department of justice was in touch with its own secret service agents and local police authorities throughout the country, and the war department was in communication with all of the state governments."

BRAZIL REPLIES TO GERMANY ON SUBJECT OF SEIZING VESSELS

Rio Janeiro, June 6.—Brazil has replied to the German note protesting against the requisitioning of German ships with a declaration that the republic has acted with the strict limits of the law, even as interpreted by Germany. The Brazilian reply says in part:

"The utilization of German ships by Brazil follows the torpedoing of Brazilian merchant ships and assures, directly and immediately although by force, satisfaction for the losses caused by German submarines. Brazil has taken a step which all nations take, even without abandoning its state of peace, for the sole reason of forcing an offending nation to make due reparation."

FRENCH DEPUTIES NAME PEACE PLAN

Declare Germany Must Return Alsace-Lorraine to France.

Territories Occupied By Germany Must Also Be Liberated.

Paris, June 6.—By a vote of 453 to 55, the chamber of deputies in secret session has adopted a resolution declaring that peace conditions must include the liberation of territories occupied by Germany, the return of Alsace-Lorraine to France and just reparation for damage done in the invaded regions. The resolution, which was accepted by the government, also favors the creation of a league of nations for the maintenance of peace.

The resolution reads:

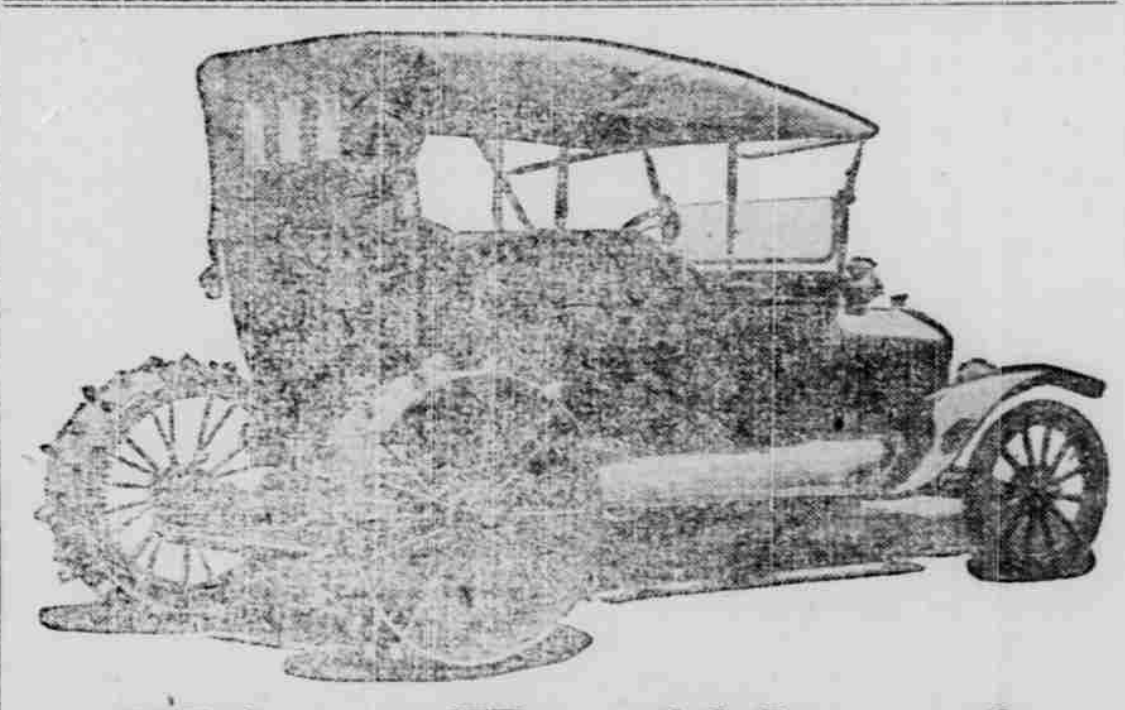
"The chamber of deputies, the direct expression of the sovereignty of the French people, salutes the Russian and other allied democracies and endorses the unanimous protest which the representatives of Alsace-Lorraine, torn from France against their will, have made to the national assembly. It declares that it expects from the war imposed upon Europe by the aggression of imperialist Germany the return of Alsace-Lorraine to the mother country, together with liberation of invaded territories and just reparation for damage.

"Far removed from all thoughts of conquest an enslavement, it expects that the efforts of the armies of the republic and her allies will secure, durable guarantees for peace and once Prussian militarism is destroyed, durable guarantees for peace and independence for peoples great and small in a league of nations such as has already been foreshadowed.

"Confident that the government will bring this about by the co-ordinated military and diplomatic action of all the allies and rejecting all amendments, the chamber passes to the order of the day."

Speaking of the resolution, Premier Ribot said:

"This resolution affirms our national sovereignty. It declares that in a democracy like ours there can be no secret diplomacy. None can or wants to fess with the national sovereignty. None has entertained such thoughts. French policy is the policy of frankness and clearness."
