BELGIANS WILL EXPRESS THEIR GRATITUDE TO U. S.

Mission Arrives in Washington to Discuss Ultimate Peace and Reparation to Be Demanded of Germany.

Washington, June 17.—Belgium's diplomatic mission came to Washington today to express its gratitude for American relief work and to discuss with American officials the reparation that is to be demanded of Germany for its violated faith at the beginning of the war and international crimes that have followed.

The mission was received with all the courtesies and probably with deeper emotions than the official missions of the greater nations that preceded.

Secretary Lansing, Councillor Polk and Assistant Secretary Phillips, of the State Department, greeted them at the station, after which they motored to the home of Larz Anderson, former minister of Belgium, which is to be their headquarters.

Baron Ludovic Moncheur, chief of the political bureau of the Belgium foreign office, and for eight years minister to this country, is the head of the mission. It is understood he expects to confine his efforts in the United States largely to the ultimate peace questions rather than to immediate war needs.

Millions for Sufferers.

In the latter he will find his wishes already met, for the United States, shortly after its entrance into the war, took over the entire cost of the relief in Belgium. Each month the treasury department advances \$7,500,000 for this purpose.

The Belgium commissioners indeed are assured of the simplest work of all the missions that yet have visited this country. They will find no need for explanation, for argument, or for negotiations. American officials have understood their case fully from the first and will spare no efforts to render fullest honors to the representatives of that nation which did not hesitate to loose everything to save its honor from the mailed fist.

The mission will be formally presented to President Wilson tomorrow and later will be received by the senate and house and will be entertained at a series of formal receptions.

ALLIES NEED U. S. AVIATORS MORE THAN SOLDIERS

Washington, D. C., June 17.—Full approval has been given by the war department to the air supremacy program of the defense council's aircraft board and President Wilson has been asked to put the administration support behind the great project, for which an appropriation of \$600,000,000 is sought.

Under the plan the United States would become a great elementary training base immediately for all the allies and enormous numbers of training machines would be turned out while American plants are developing a serviceable battle craft type. By next spring the board proposes to have the allies ready to literally drive the Germans from the air.

"The program seems by all means the most effective way in which to exert America's force at once in telling fashion," said Secretary Baker today.

"We can train thousands of aviators and build thousands of machines without interfering in the slightest with the plans for building up our armies and for supplying the allies with food and munitions.

"The aircraft plan meets the demands of the situation. According to the best obtainable information, there are about 7,000,000 men on the western front today. The addition of a few infantry units, while of great moral value, would count for little on the forcing of a decision. A few thousand trained aviators, however, may spell the whole difference between victory and defeat."

PEACE OFFERED TO MUSCOVETES ON OWN TERMS

Germany Reported to Have Agreed to Waive Demands for Land and Money.

THROUGH THE GOOD OFFICES OF SWISS

"No Indemnitites or Annexation" Ever Sought From Eastern Neighbor.

Petrograd, June 17.—Via London.

A stirring proclamation placing the council of workmen and soldiers' delegates on record as irrevocably opposed to a separate peace was adopted by the council. The proclamation was prompted by Austrian efforts to lure Russia into a separate peace.

London, June 16.—From Stockholm, at present the center of peace gossip, inspired and spontaneous, mostly inspired, a report came today that Germany, through the good offices of a member of the Swiss federal council, has offered peace to Russia.

Simultaneously a Berne dispatch asserted that the federal council, seeing no chances of success at present, will not take the initiative in proposing peace to the belligerents. The council, it was said, would disregard various petitions requesting peace proposals.

Speculation was promptly set aflutter here whether the council had stated its position thus in order to disavow from the outset any efforts which the unnamed member is to make in behalf of Germany.

Wilson Attacked.

There would be nothing surprising in the reported formal German offer, observers here point out. Germany and its allies have courted peace with Russia ever since the Muscovite revolution.

German statesman have taken special pains to convince the Russian council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates that the latter's aims and principles are also those of Germany. Only today the German government's organ, the Nord Deutsche Allegemeine Zeitung emphasized this point, saying Germany never sought annexations or indemnitites from Russia, and, therefore, subscribed to the council's doctrine of "no annexations or indemnitites," though the article hints unmistakably that this applies only to Russia.

The same organ bitterly attacks President Wilson's note to Russia as aimed at "inflaming the war passion" of that country and proving Mr. Wilson's inconsistency.

Teuton Intrigues Exposed.

Petrograd, Via London, June 16.—Fresh attempts on the part of the Germans to conclude peace with Russia have been exposed, with the result that the expulsion from Russia has been ordered of a prominent socialist internationalist, a citizen of Switzerland, Robert Grimm.

Two days ago the provisional government received from a reliable source a copy of a dispatch addressed by Hoffman, a member of the Swiss federal council, to Grimm. Apart from the separate peace offer contained in the dispatch Hoffman reported that Germany and its allies were ready to begin general and immediate peace negotiations if Russian allies were willing.

Handed to Grimm.

The provisional government apparently was informed that this dispatch had been handed to Grimm by the Swiss minister at Petrograd. The government requested the socialist member of the cabinet, M. Tseretelli and M. Skobelev, to demand explanations from Grimm, who was their colleague, inasmuch as, though a foreigner, he was beginning to play a prominent role in Petrograd as the mouthpiece of the internationalist pacifist propaganda.

An official statement issued today declares that Grimm denied to the cabinet members that the Swiss minister had transmitted to him such a dispatch, denouncing the whole affair as a clumsy German maneuver.

Ordered Expelled.

Grimm added that while at Berne and Stockholm he had refused to enter into any such negotiations and that as a socialist he refused to let himself be made the instrument of imperialist plans.

The two Russian ministers reported to the cabinet that Grimm's explanation was unsatisfactory. Whereupon an immediate expulsion order was issued.

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AUTOMOBILE THIEF IS HEADED FOR THE STATE PENITENTIARY

The men who participated in the stealing of the automobile of John Richardson in this city last Thursday evening have completed the course of the law and one of them is headed for the penitentiary at Lincoln. The men were secured by Sheriff Quinton in Omaha Friday and brought to this city, where they were arraigned before County Judge Beeson on a complaint filed by County Attorney Cole and bound over to the district court. Saturday evening Judge Begley held a short session of district court to hear the plea of the two men, Frank O'Brien and Nick Mercurie, and to the charge the two offenders entered a plea of guilty. O'Brien, who had been the leader in the crime, and had stolen the car and driven it to Omaha, was given a sentence of from one to seven years in the penitentiary, while Mercurie, who it seems was involved in the affair merely as a companion of O'Brien, and did not have any active part in the taking of the car aside from being in the company of O'Brien, was fined \$25 and costs, which will amount to something like \$70 before the matter is settled up. Mercurie is arranging for the payment of the fine and will be released from custody as soon as it is settled. This is very prompt work on the part of Sheriff Quinton and County Attorney Cole and the securing of the plea of guilty from the men by the county attorney has saved the county a considerable sum that would have had to be expended in a jury trial if the men had stood pat and demanded it, although there was little doubt of their guilt.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION MEETS IN OMAHA TOMORROW

The state convention of the Nebraska Sunday School association will open tomorrow at Omaha, and promises to be the greatest gathering of its nature ever held in the state. An automobile caravan from all sections of the state into Omaha is planned for the event and the attendance will reach into the thousands if the plans of the committee in charge materialize as it is hoped.

To attend this convention, from 200 to 300 representatives of the Cass county association will be present and expect to make the trip by automobile. The representatives from the western portion of the county will assemble at Manley tomorrow morning and proceed to Weeping Water, and from there to Union, where they strike the Omaha-Kansas City auto road, and will follow that road into Omaha. The members of the party will reach Plattsouth at noon and will have dinner in this city, where the Plattsouth delegation will join the caravan and proceed with them to Omaha. The visitors during their stay in the city should be given the hospitality of the city and a recognition given them by the civic organizations. With the large number that is expected there will be requirements for rest rooms for the ladies and facilities for cleaning up and resting from the trip before they leave for Omaha.
