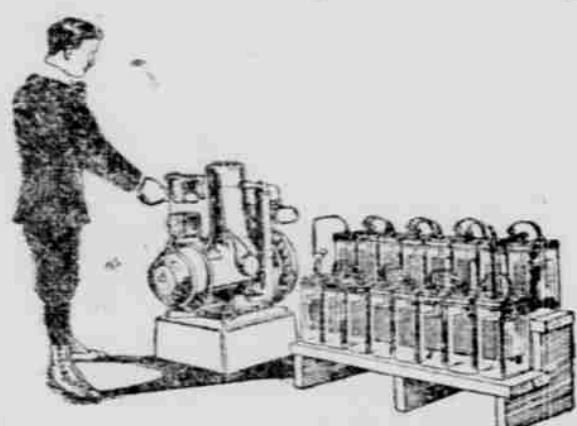

BAKER CONFIRMS DES MOINES SITE FOR ARMY CAMP

Omaha Loses Cantonment Selection
When Secretary Approves
Former Choice.

OMAHANS' MISSION TO GENERAL BARRY FUTILE

Two Local Delegations Strive Hard
to Bring Draft Division Here.

Omaha, June 27. — Secretary of War Baker today finally confirmed Major General Barry's choice of Des Moines, Ia., as the site of one of the sixteen army cantonment camps, over the protest of committees from Omaha, Cedar Rapids, Ia., and the Twin Cities. The draft army from the thirteenth district, including Minnesota, the Dakotas, Nebraska and Iowa will be trained at this point.

In a supplemental report to the secretary of war, General Barry stated that after personal examination of the grounds at Des Moines he was entirely satisfied of its suitability for military purposes.

Omahans' Efforts.

An Omaha committee left last night for Chicago, where they were to meet General Barry this morning and present Omaha's advantages for the cantonment camp. They intended to ask General Barry to come to Omaha himself and look over two sites, one north and one west of Florence, as well as the originally proposed site near Fort Crook.

This committee did not see General Barry before the confirmation of the Des Moines selection was announced at Washington.

Another Omaha committee, in Washington, had received assurance from Secretary Baker that Omaha's prospectus would receive due attention from General Barry.

Although Omahans were boosting until after Des Moines choice was finally announced, their hopes of securing the cantonment camp were high at no time.

Committee on Return.

It is felt here that the Omaha site did not receive the attention due it by the inspecting army officers. The noon after Colonel Morgan and his commission were in Omaha a telegram advising the Omaha committee to go no further with its arrangements for the cantonment was received.

The cantonment at Washington and Chicago will begin their return trip today. The committee to see General Barry consisted of T. C. Byrne, H. E. Newbranch, H. H. Baldrige, Luther Drake, G. W. Holdrege, John L. Kennedy, H. A. Tukey, Victor Rosewater and Gould Dietz.

Des Moines business men last night raised \$50,000 in fifteen minutes to improve facilities at and to the camp, in order to keep the camp there.

OHIO GOVERNOR THREATENS JAIL FOR COAL MEN

Bellefontaine, O., June 26.—Governor James Cox is going after reductions in coal prices with a "loaded gun." He made this announcement here today in an article at the raising of a flag on the highest point of land in Ohio.

The coal operators of Ohio will meet in the governor's office next Friday.

"I am not going to consult the constitution and the law books when it is apparent what is the perfectly right thing to do," the governor said. "And if it is necessary to lock some people up I will agree to be the jailer."

HERE'S HOW YOUR UNCLE SAM WILL PICK HIS ARMY

Washington, D. C., June 26.—Further details of the plan by which the young men to compose the new national army will be selected impersonally from Washington were learned today.

Under the plan proposed by General Crowder every card in every registration unit in the United States will be numbered from one up to the limit of registration in that unit.

Corresponding numbers will be placed in a box and drawn out by the military and naval committees of the house and senate until as many numbers are drawn as are necessary to make up the 1,500,000 men who will be selected at the first drawing.

Thus, for example, if the committees should draw out of the box No. 182, every young man in the country whose registration card bears the number 182 would be regarded as selected for service. The provost marshal general has received from each registration unit word of how many registrations there were in that unit.

The numbers to be placed in the by the committee, it would mean that est number of registrations in the largest unit in the United States.

Thus, if No. 1 should be drawn out by the committee, it would mean that there will be one man drawn from every unit, but if a high number, such as 700, should be drawn, no man would be selected from many units, for the reason that there were not that many registrations in many places.

If by this process any state should be called on to furnish more than its fair quota of troops, its numbers would be reduced without affecting the draft, because a large surplus of men will be drawn to provide for such emergencies.

It has been determined by the provost marshal general that this is the best method that can be devised to insure a fair drawing.

GOOD LAW ADOPTED BY THE MODERN WOODMEN

The Modern Woodmen of America at their head camp at Chicago last week adopted a measure that is to be made a part of the law of the order that is patriotic and shows the feeling that beats within the hearts of those composing this great fraternity. This was the adoption of a law providing for the payment by each member of 20c per month additional on their assessments for the purpose of the payment of the insurance policies of the members of the order who are in the service of their country and may be killed in battle or at sea. This provision means that each man of the Woodman order who is killed in action or dies in the service will leave to his beneficiaries a policy of \$1,000. This small sum each month from every member will amply care for all claims that will arise from the losses in battle and will bring relief to those who have their loved ones taken away, while to the soldier and sailor it means that his policy in the M. W. A. is as good as gold and will be paid through the fraternal spirit of his fellow members.

FROM PERU NORMAL.

Cass county is "doing her bit" at Peru State Normal this summer, being represented "thirty strong."

Peru students are being delighted and greatly benefited this week by a series of lectures on rural education by Dr. Foght, the celebrated national specialist in rural education.

In spite of the war situation, Peru has a larger enrollment of boys than was expected. All the regular courses will be offered this fall, as it is felt that the need of trained teachers will be greater than ever.

The new courses for rural teachers will be in full operation at the opening of the fall term. These include a two years' course for mature students who have completed the work in the elementary schools, also an added two-years' course for high school graduates and teachers of experience. The Teachers' Bureau of the Normal school has received more calls this year than ever before for teachers who are competent to take charge of rural high schools. These calls come from every part of Nebraska.

Peru enthusiasm and the old-fashioned Peru spirit demonstrated itself in a marked degree at a general convocation recently, when the budget tickets for school activities were offered for sale. The budget committee had set the mark at 400 tickets, but the students purchased 602 tickets within the period of a few minutes. The budget system at Peru permits the students to attend all school activities for the entire summer, including the Dramatic club play, "Cousin Kate,"—which was fine, indeed; several base ball games, a stunt event, and a six-day chautauqua. The same chautauqua numbers will appear in Peru that are to come to Plattsmouth. The budget ticket covers all these things, for the nominal sum of two dollars.

The budget committee has purchased two one-hundred dollar Liberty bonds with money which has been saved since the budget system has been in use.

Peru's share of Red Cross work will be done. The boys are giving their money and the girls are doing their share of the work.

Prof. Beck, who has served with the regulars, is giving military drill, which is very popular with the boys and a large number are taking part.
