**RUSSIANS GAIN GROUND, ADMITS A BERLIN REPORT**

Germany says Slavs make progress in new offensive against Haliaz.

Enthusiasm among Brusiloff's troops declared to be increasing.

Berlin (Via London), July 5.—In a renewal of their attack at Stanislaw, south of Haliaz, the Ley to Lemberg, Russian troops have gained ground, the war office announced tonight.

Petrograd, July 5.—According to semi-official reports, the Russian offensive is spreading to the north and south of Haliaz, in eastern Galicia, which was virtually under the guns of general Brusiloff when the advance of a year ago came to a standstill. Haliaz is important as the key to Lemberg, the capital of Galicia, and is about sixty miles southeast of that city.

Some activity is reported along the northern front.

The enthusiasm among the troops is increasing.

The government has ordered the release of Polish prisoners of war captured in the German ranks.

London, July 5.—German efforts to dislodge the Russians from positions gained at Godov and Konichy a week ago have been repulsed by General Brusiloff's men. Attacks come miles to the north and around Brze-

**NEED HALF BILLION DOLLARS MORE TO BUILD U. S. SHIPS**

Washington, July 5.—Another appropriation of half a billion dollars for shipbuilding probably will be asked of congress immediately by the administration. Contracts already let and about to be closed, the shipping board announced tonight, have absorbed the first \$500,000,000.

Announcement of the intention to ask for a second appropriation was contained in a statement issued tonight by Chairman Denman of the shipping board, which carried the intimation that the second sum may be used largely for wooden construction.

"The vast resources of quick wood construction," it said, "are still far from exhausted and we believe more steel contracts can be placed. We need wooden vessels of both slow and fast speeds. The slower can relieve our coastwise congestion and our car shortage. Many wooden ships can be built which are faster than the majority of vessels now crossing the war zone."

**ONE DRAWING GETS ONE MAN IN EACH DISTRICT**

Person in Every Exemption Zone Taken With Every Number From Wheel.

**MAINTAIN SILENCE AS TO THE METHOD**

Complications Certain as More Eligibles in Some Divisions Than in Others.

Washington, D. C., July 6.—Selection day for the new national army is approaching rapidly as the local exemption boards in the various states complete their organization. Indications are that the drawing will be held next week, but no official statement has been made as to the war department's plans.

Administration officials still maintain strict silence as to the method to be followed. It is understood, however, that it is proposed to place in a single jury wheel in Washington one complete set of numbers.

When a number is taken from the wheel the man in each exemption district whose card bears that serial number will be drafted. Thus as each number is drawn approximately 30,000 men will be drafted, or one in each exemption district. If 1,200,000 men are to be called before the exemption boards in the first selection, which seems highly probable, only forty numbers would need to be drawn.

Draft 30,000 at a Time.

There are numerous complications which must arise, however, and the method of solving them can be known only when the administration make known its plan in detail. For instance, the number of registered individuals in each district who are liable for military service will certainly not be the same. Aliens are registered, but not liable for duty.

To Balance Chances.

Provisions must be made also to balance as far as possible the chances of military duty between the men in each district, so that disqualification of a large number in any particular district for any reason will not put upon those disqualified additional likelihood of being sent to the front.

Various ways of making the draft as fair as possible have been suggested. The matter has had President Wilson's personal consideration in line with his pledge that the method employed would be just in every respect.

While the first contingent of the new army under the bill is limited to 500,000 men, an additional 125,000 or 150,000 will be needed to make up the reserve battalions of this force. Reserve battalions are now being recruited for the national guard when it is drafted into the federal service. The organization of the national army will be on the same basis.

Number of Exemptions.

It may be necessary also to draft enough men to fill up the regulars and national guard to war strength, although no decision to this end has been reached as yet. The regulars are now close to war strength and the guard units are recruiting rapidly. If possible they will be completed by the war volunteer system.

There is one other consideration which will affect the total number of men to be drawn. Opinion varies as to the number of exemptions which must be made for the various causes outlined in the extended regulations.

A rough estimate of at least 50 per cent exemptions for physical or other reasons has been generally employed in computing the probable size of the task before the exemption boards.

May Call Million Men.

It is not known whether the government plans to call double the number actually needed on the first selection in order to provide against these exemptions. Possibly only the smaller number will be taken, to be filled out by later selections until the ranks are full. If the exemption factor is allowed for the first drawing, however, it seems likely that 1,000,000 or 1,500,000 names would be provided for at that time, the men to appear for examination in the order in which they were drawn and the cards of those not reached in any district where the quota was filled before they came up before the board to be returned.

Another factor which is being worked out in the selection regulations is the provision of the law requiring that each state be given credit at the drawings for the number of men it has supplied as volunteers in the regular army or the national guard.

**DATE OF DRAWING FOR DRAFT ARMY NOT YET KNOWN**

Washington, D. C., July 6.—Secretary Baker and Provost Marshal General Crowder today were completing the final details of the method to be employed in selecting registrants for the national army, but the date of the drawings has not yet been announced. A complete organization of every local and district organization board is necessary before the draft machinery can begin to operate. The drawings will be in Washington and indications point to the use of numbers instead of names in making selections.

As there will be exemptions among the drafted before the first increment of 625,000 men can actually be assembled, necessarily more than that number of names will be drafted on the first operation. It is probable that as many as a million or two million names might be drawn and from them exemptions will be made. Then the first army of 625,000 men will be formed. Other troops will be drawn from the remainder until it is decided to raise another increment.

**REGISTERED YOUTH TOLD TO BE READY**

Crowder Notifies Eligible Men to Be Prepared to Appear Before Boards.

Government Circular Does Not Cover Summoning of Persons For Actual Service.

Washington, D. C., July 5.—Another step in building the selective conscription army was taken today by the distribution of a circular by Provost Marshal General Crowder, notifying the registered men to hold themselves in readiness for appearance before the boards which will conduct examinations and consider exemptions.

How or when the government will select the men to be examined is not detailed in the circular, but it is revealed that registrations cards in each county or city jurisdiction are to be numbered with red ink and that "as soon as the drawing is complete lists showing in the press and will be posted at the office of each local board." It already has been announced that the selection will take place in Washington and the general presumption has been that some device similar to a jury wheel will be employed.

Exemptions are to be determined by the local boards, the circular shows, only for the previously announced specified causes, such as responsibility for the support of relatives and not for agricultural or industrial reasons. Seven days after designations are posted will be allowed for filing claims. There will be an additional allowance of ten days for filing proofs, and the board must decide within three days after the proof is filed.

When the case of any registrant has been disposed of so far as the local board is concerned, the names of those not exempted or discharged will be posted. Claims for exemption for agricultural or industrial work must be made within five days after such posting and must go direct to the higher board sitting for the judicial district. Appeals for the rulings of local boards must be made to the higher boards within ten days.

The circular does not cover the summoning of the men for actual service, pointing out that selection and acceptance does not mean an immediate summons.

Even the time of the drawing is not specified, but issuance of the circular is taken to mean that the work of selection may be in progress within a few days. September 1 has been tentatively considered as the date for assembling the first half million men in cantonments for training.

**CUTRIGHT ASSISTANT ATTORNEY GENERAL**

Lincoln, Neb., July 8.—Attorney General Willis E. Reed announced today the appointment of John L. Cutright, of Lincoln, as first assistant attorney general, succeeding Deputy Attorney General C. S. Roe, who was promoted recently. Mr. Roe took the place of former Deputy Attorney General Dexter T. Barrett, who resigned.

Cutright's promotion carries with it an increase in salary from \$1,800 to \$2,000 a year.

As third assistant attorney general in place of Cutright, Mr. Reed has named Alfred Munger, a son of Judge T. C. Munger, of Lincoln. Young Munger has been practicing law in Omaha for two years in the law firm headed by H. F. Rose.

The third assistant's position is one created by the last legislature, the intention being that its incumbent should devote himself to especially enforcing prohibition and to such other work as he might be assigned.
