The Daily Mail in an editorial congratulates the American intelligence service "on the second great exploit of this year" and says:

"A blacker piece of diplomatic tf deviltry on Germany's part never was exposed while on Sweden's part an offense against neutrality and against every decency of international intercourse, deep, deliberate and despicable-how despicable can only be realized when we recall that Sweden has herself suffered from such outrages as she is assisting Germany to inflict upon Argentina.

"Such conduct combines maximum cowardice with maximum treachery, and we are confident that every honest Swede will promptly resent it as a cruel stain upon national honor and demand a strict which wil be good news to her many account from the government that juggled the country into a position so basely callous and dishonorable.
