

BIOGRAPHY

Frederick Dale Wood (mostly known as Fred Dale Wood and as Fred Dale to his intimates) is of Virginia parent; age and ancestry, his forbears having been members of the Virginia colony arrived this week for an extended 100 years before the Declaration of In-Missouri, Iowa and Nebraska, and when still a boy fared forth to see the . world on his own account. The West was really "wild and woolly" in those days, and he suffered many hardships, but gained much experience.

He did almost every kind of work a growing boy could do, from working in a cowboy. He found time to learn the printer's trade and read law, being handicapped badly in the latter by lack of education.

During President Cleveland's first term life was given a place in the In-
