SELECTING SEED CORN.

More than ordinary care must be taken at this season of the year in selecting seed corn, according to the agronomy department of the University of Nebraska. If old corn is available, it will probably prove a better source of seed corn than the new crop. Corn cut before the early freeze will also prove a good source of seed. After the seed has been selected, it should be dried out and stored where the air circulates freely. A common method is to hang the corn or strings in a shed. If convenient, it is not a bad practice to hang the corn in the house where there is added heat.
