Weather conditions were blamed for this, but it was clear also that fuel administration officials felt that a general embargo, against the re ceipt of freight during the five-day closing period would have helped materially in this respect.

Garfield's Statement. Dr. Garfield said:

"Our reports show that the prime purpose sought to be accomplished by the regulation, the bunkering of ships and the supply of domestic consumers and public utilities with coal, have been greatly served.

"Local officials of the fuel adminstration in all parts of the east re ported that consumers, on the preferred list in the industrial curtail ment order were being given the full benefit of the coal moving into the consuming territory.


