From Saturday's Daily. Moses Hiatt was born near Peoria. transacting business in Plattsmouth Ill., April 11, 1836 and died in Murray, Nebraska, January 17, 1918. When he was twelve years old his father moved his family to Iowa and became owner of the land on which the town of Sidney the county seat of Fremont county is now located.

June 22nd, 1856 at Sidney, Iowa, he was united in marriage to Mallissa Kauble, a relation which brought much mutual happiness, until terminated by Mr. Hiatt's death.
