CHANGE IN CAMP DESIGNATED

Instead of Funston, Cass County's Fourteen will Be Sent to Fort Logan, Colo.

From Thursday's Daily. Under the draft regulations an nounced last week simultaneously with the order for mobilization of approximately 50,000 more men on May 1st to 5th, Cass county's quota to help make up this number will he fourteen. The new rulings also prescribe that these men, instead of being sent to Camp Funston, are to at once intensive military training.

In a list published in the Journal a few days ago was the names of a sufficient number of men to fill the April 26th quota and to leave a few over, provided none are rejected that have been accepted by th local should there be any, but if not, the May 1st to 5th quota will begin at the leaving off of the April one, and continue on through the present list or until sufficient men are obtained to fill the quota. If any in this list are then left uncertified for service they will be reserved to head the list of those named t ogo with the next

With the official dispatches declaring that 150,000 are to be called in May. It is quite probable several small quotas will be sent out during next month from time to time.
