COUNTY IS SIX HUNDRED DOLLARS TO THE GOOD NOW

AS A RESULT OF LATEST RAID ON BOOZE CARS SUNDAY FORENOON, LAST.

Fines Have Now All Been Liquidated—Chattel Mortgage on Car and It Was Released.

From Thursday's Daily. Mrs. Robert Novok, wife of the man who has been in the county jail for transporting whiskey, appeared yesterday afternoon, and paid the fine assessed against him, which was two hundred dollars and the costs. Mr. Novok was accordingly released from jail and went on his way home. Mrs. Novok came with interpreter "Peter," the high man of the Servians, in Omaha, who did the talking, as it is but little English the others can speak.

The car had a chattel mortgage on it for something like \$220 and upon the payment of the fine and costs, the car was released, and like so many rabbits, they scurried out of this man's town.

This has made a total of six hundred dollars in fines collected from the occupants of the two cars captured last Sunday, together with costs aggregating some \$40, to say nothing of the liquor confiscated.

WRITES FIRST HAIL INSURANCE

From Thursday's Daily. This morning Frank J. Lieberthal county clerk wrote the first policy for farmers hail insurance, which is being placed upon the growing crops by the state. The assessors take the application, and for this they receive one half a cent per acre. The state charges 25 cents per acre for the insurance, and this policy which was written today was for crops being grown by Edward Ernest living in Stone Creek precinct. The number of acres being 26, and the policy costing \$21.50 and the application 43 cents the latter going to the assessor of that precinct C. W. Jewell.

CELEBRATED GOLDEN WEDDING ANNIVERSARY IN WEST

PLANS TO OBSERVE OCCASION HERE HELD UP ON ADVICE OF THE PHYSICIANS.

C. E. Wescott and Wife Married at La Porte, Indiana, in the Year of 1868.

From Thursday's Daily. Last Saturday, at Los Angeles, California, was celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the wedding of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Wescott, who for many years made their home in this city. Mr. Wescott and wife came to this city in 1879, and engaged in business, remaining until 1910, when they went to California to make their home and have lived there ever since.

Mr. Wescott and wife were among the best citizens of Plattsmouth and have a large number of friends, who remember their many kindnesses while here. There were present at the celebration of their immediately family, only Earl Wescott and family, although many of their former friends from here and few ones formed out there were present to wish them good cheer and happiness.

It was originally planned that the celebration was to be here among the friends and scenes which time and association had endeared to them. But at this time of year the traveling is bad and the weather is as a rule such that it would not be the safest for traveling, and so, under the advice of the physicians both here and there, it was considered as best not to make the trip until later in the season. The plans had been partially formulated for the past two years for the celebration of this here, where they had lived for nearly a third of a century and where, doubtless, they cherish many most pleasant recollections.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we whose names are hereunto attached, have associated ourselves together for the purpose of becoming a Co-Operative Association under the laws of the state of Nebraska, and for that purpose, do hereby adopt these Articles of Incorporation.

ARTICLE I: The name of this Corporation shall be the Farmers' Union Co-Operative Association.

ARTICLE II: The principal place of transacting the business of this Corporation shall be at Alvo, Nebraska, and such other places as the directors shall elect.

ARTICLE III: The general nature of the business to be conducted by said Corporation shall be the buying and selling of grain, seed, hay, live stock and all products of the farm, and merchandise of all kinds and to acquire by purchase or lease such real estate as may be necessary for the transaction of the business.

ARTICLE IV: The Association shall continue for a period of fifty (50) years from date of incorporation, which shall be February 28, 1918.

ARTICLE V: The amount of Capital stock of this Corporation shall be \$50,000, which shall be divided into 1000 shares at \$50.00 each. \$6,200.00 shall be fully paid in at the time of commencement of business. This stock shall be non-assessable. The highest amount of indebtedness to which this Corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not exceed two-thirds of the capital stock.

ARTICLE VI: The affairs of this Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Seven Directors, who shall be elected annually by the Stockholders. The Board of Directors shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer from their number.

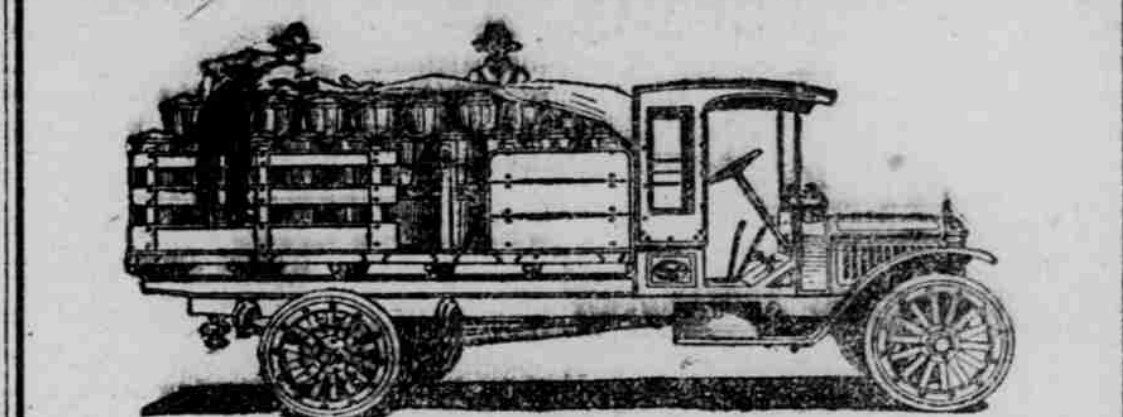

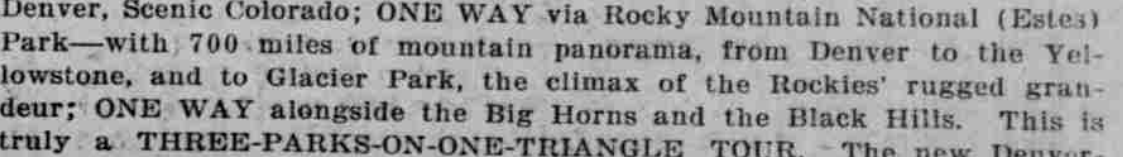
Note the Burlington Map and Its Three Western Trunk Lines:
