ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we whose names are hereto attached, have associated ourselves together for the purpose of becoming a Co-Operative Association under the laws of the State of Nebraska, and for that purpose, do hereby adopt these Articles of Incorporation.

ARTICLE I: The name of this Corporation shall be the Farmers' Union Co-Operative Association.

ARTICLE II: The principal place of transacting the business of this Corporation shall be at Alvo, Nebraska, and such other places as the Directors shall elect.

ARTICLE III: The general nature of the business to be transacted by said Corporation shall be the buying and selling of grain, seed, hay, live stock and all products of the farm, and merchandise of all kinds and to acquire by purchase or lease such real estate as may be necessary for the transaction of the business.

ARTICLE IV: The Association shall continue for a period of fifty (50) years from date of incorporation, which shall be February 28, 1918.

ARTICLE V: The amount of Capital stock of this Corporation shall be \$50,000, which shall be divided into 1000 shares at \$50.00 each, \$5,000.00 shall be paid up at the time of commencement of business. This stock shall be non-assessable. The highest amount of stock to which this Corporation shall not exceed two-thirds of the paid up capital stock.

ARTICLE VI: The affairs of this Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of seven Directors who shall be elected annually by the Stockholders. The Board of Directors shall elect a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer from their number.
