THE NATIONAL PARKS OPEN SEASON 1918

He has been directing the disposal of seed corn at the Stull cribs and tells of some one holding a turn-number well up toward a hundred jumping into the crib ahead of a man holding a number below the dozen mark. He said they were like a lot of school boys scrambling after peanuts.

Night before last Mr. Snipes held a meeting at Greenwood, after having been at the crib all day, and after he had attended to the business connected with this meeting he returned to his home at Weeping Water, getting to bed away after one o'clock with another hard day's labor ahead of him at the crib. Still, with three or four hours sleep night-ly he keeps right on going. But these, you know, are stringent times and besides this is the county agent's particularly busy season.

FOR SHOOTING BIRDS

From Thursday's Daily. Some one has been shooting birds in the city contrary to the laws and the ordinances of the city and in an effort to stop the practice the county authorities are going to prosecute those who have been guilty of such offense. Besides the matter of the killing of the birds which are desired by the farmers and others, the shooting within the city limits makes it dangerous for the citizens.

FATHER REPORTED BETTER.

From Thursday's Daily. About a week ago Howard Newton was called to the western portion of the state on account of the serious illness of his father, who make his home on a ranch there. Mr. Newton returned home this morning after having stayed with his parents for about a week, and reported that he is greatly improved in his condition though still far from being well.

THE SEED CORN QUESTION

From Thursday's Daily. Yesterday there was shelled and delivered to the elevator of Nelson Jean the remainder of the seed corn stored in the L. C. Stull cribs. This corn will be disposed of, through the elevator, to farmers hereabouts as long as it lasts at the uniform price of \$4.99 per bushel. The corn is shelled and in very good shape for being ungraded. But as with all such corn it contains some points of ears and small grains and if the purchaser so desires he can have it graded for size and to eliminate these troublesome points of the ears.

In order to come out on the corn, the additional charge above the price at the crib has to be made. The county agent has the matter of disposition of this seed corn in hand, and those wishing to obtain good seed corn can get it as long as it lasts at the elevator of Mr. Jean at the Missouri Pacific station, but it is quite probable it will not last a great length of time as there is already less than five hundred bushels left.

INJURED BY AUTOMOBILE.

From Thursday's Daily. Yesterday morning, John W. Falter went to his farm northwest of the city to look after things there, and as the car in which he contemplated making the trip was not having at its best, he took another which was standing nearby, and on which there was a power attachment applied to the front end of the crank shaft. After he had started the power, he thought that there might possibly be need of water in the radiator, which he got and proceeded with the task of filling the same. In doing so he crowded close to the car and his clothing became entangled in the power attachment, drawing him up against the pulley and throwing him off his feet, whirling him around with considerable force. The machinery caught one leg of his pants and tearing the clothing away the calf of his leg was badly lacerated and mangled, the skin being torn and the muscles ruptured. Had it not been for the presence of mind of Wesley Birdick, the man who lives on the place and who was nearby at the time, which prompted him to turn off the spark and shut off the gas almost instant-

ly, the results would probably have been much more serious and Mr. Falter might even have been killed. As it was the injury was so great as to require fourteen stitches to close the wound, which will lay the young man up for a considerable length of time.

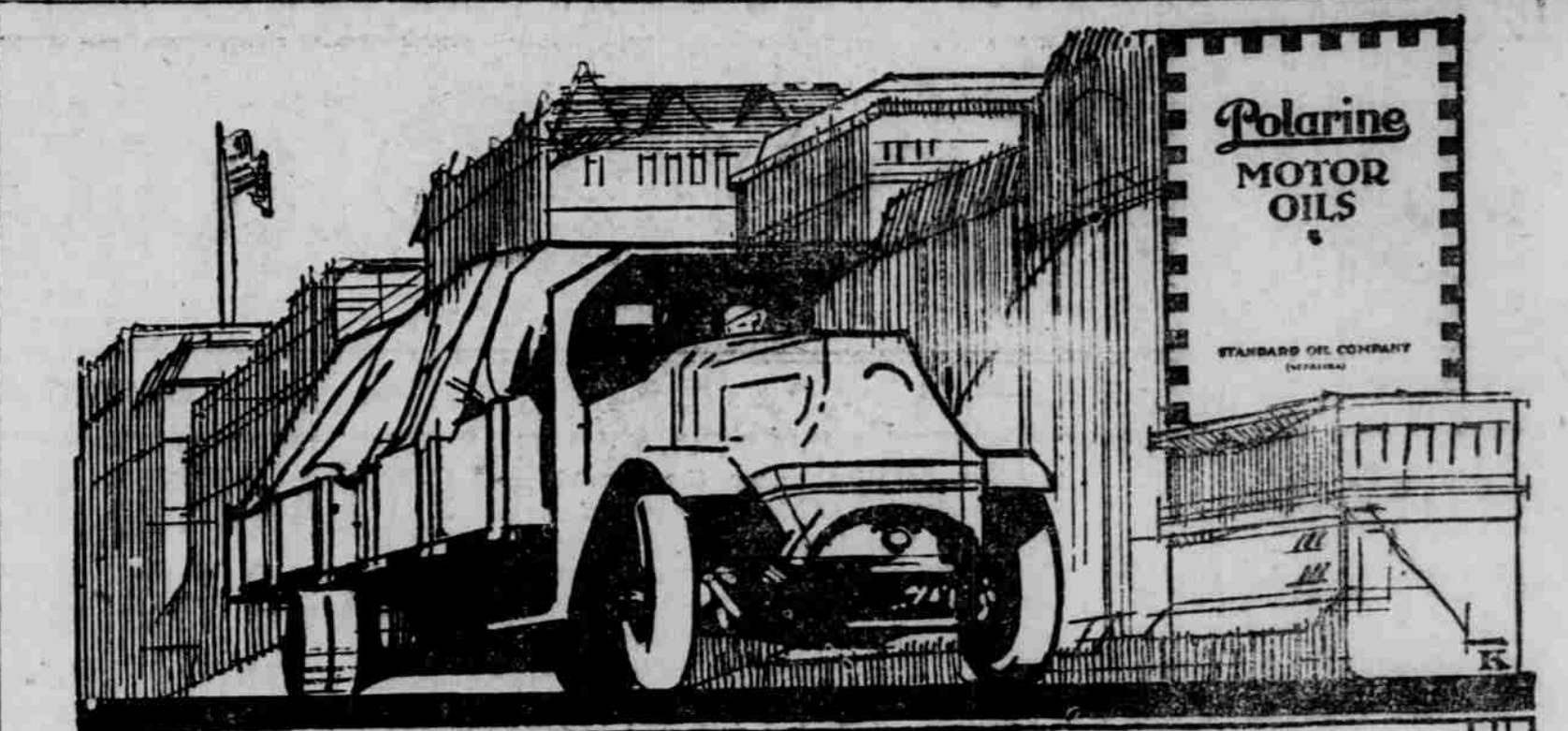

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we whose names are hereto attached, have associated ourselves together for the purpose of becoming a Co-operative Association under the laws of the State of Nebraska, and for that purpose, do hereby adopt these Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I: The name of this Corporation shall be the Farmers' Union Co-operative Association.

ARTICLE II: The principal place of transacting the business of this Corporation shall be at Ains, Nebraska, and such other places as the Directors shall elect.

ARTICLE III: The general nature of the business to be transacted by said Corporation shall be the buying and selling of grain, seed, hay, live stock and all products of the farm, also merchandise of all kinds and to acquire by purchase or lease such real estate as may be necessary for the transaction of the business.

ARTICLE IV: The Association shall continue for a period of fifty (50) years from date of incorporation, which shall be February 28, 1918.

ARTICLE V: The amount of Capital stock of this Corporation shall be \$50,000, which shall be divided into 1000 shares at \$50.00 each, \$2,000.00 shall be fully paid in at the time of commencement of business. This stock shall be non-assessable. The highest amount of indebtedness to which this Corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not exceed two-thirds of the paid up capital stock.

ARTICLE VI: The affairs of this Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Seven Directors who shall be elected annually by the Stockholders. The Board of Directors shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer from their number.

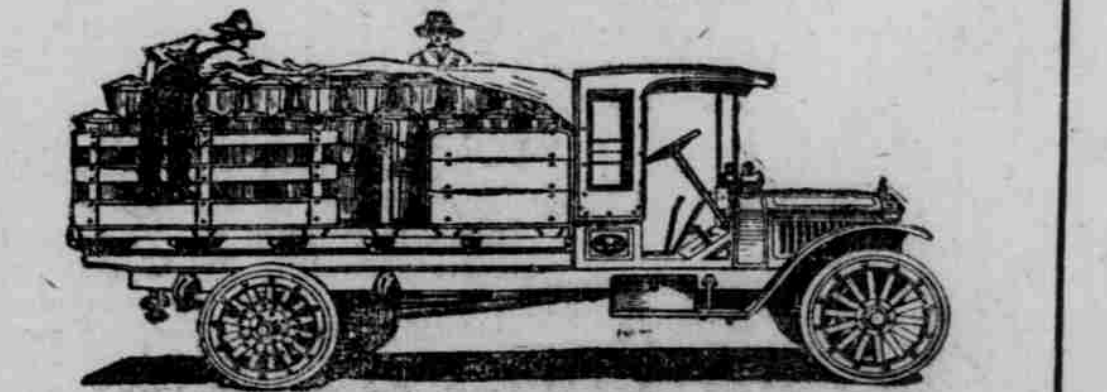
