## SKILLED MEN ARE WANTED FOR ARMY

THE NEED OF TRAINED MEN IN ALL AVOCATIONS ARE NOW NEEDED.

The following is from the District Board of Nebraska, and is issued to all local boards.

State Headquarters is in receipt of a telegram which will be given you below indicating that a call may be expected about July 20th for skilled men for the Engineer Corps. Please note carefully the instructions in the telegram as to the kind of registrants who may volunteer, but do not send in any names or numbers to this office until you get a further bulletin which is being prepared giving more specific instructions as to manner of reporting volunteers and available. In this call as in former calls this office desires to not only know how many volunteers but how many men you have available for draft and we are preparing a form upon which you can make report.

I am asking the newspapers of the state to print the news of this call and wish you would ask your local papers to advertise it as much as they can prior to July 17th.

The telegram of the Provost Marshal General is as follows:

"No. E-1729. The Engineer Corps is in need of certain skilled men. Only white men qualified for general military service may be accepted under this call. No man who is needed to fill the July calls already announced should be allowed to volunteer for this service. Volunteers may be accepted from the 1918 class provided the registrants waive all time limits for classification and examination.

The following types of men are desired: Auto repairmen, ax-men, blacksmiths, boatmen, bridge carpenters, cabinet makers, caulkers, concrete foremen, concrete workers, construction foreman, cooks, draftsmen, electricians, gas engine men, stationary engine men, farrers, horseshoers, lithographers, machinists, buglers, photographers, plumbers, powdermen, quarrymen, riggers, shoemakers, surveyors, tailors, teamsters, telephone operators, timbermen and typographers.

Please give the widest publicity to this matter using the "Nation's Want Column" method and urging qualified registrants to present themselves to their local boards for listing. If a sufficient number of volunteers are not secured, involuntary induction will be used. On July 18th wire this office the number of qualified men listed in each of the above occupations which you may expect from your state. Upon receipt of this information we will make definite allotments and complete mobilization details. Local Boards must understand thoroughly that these registrants are not to be inducted until orders are received as to allotments and that no men needed to fill the July calls already announced shall be permitted to volunteer. Volunteers for this service shall not be released to the Navy or Marine Corps or allowed to withdraw their application prior to August 1st. —CROWDER."

### THE CARS GET TOGETHER.


