

CLASSIFICATION OF LAST REGISTRATION

Showing The Different Classes, And The Number of Each Class With Letters

Herewith we are giving the classification of the registrants who registered at the last day June 5th, of the hundred and twenty who registered, there are seventy-five who were placed in class one, and who not counting the letter are nearly of the same standing. The names are arranged in alphabetical order and with the register number and order with the address and classification which makes all easy to find, and tells just where they are. Of the number there are eighteen who were placed in class two by the local board, and kept there and two more who were placed in class 2, but were changed to class 3 by the district board, ten who were placed in class three, and the two from class two, which were brought to this class. Four were placed in class 4, and two in class five, while there were seven which have not revived any classification as yet. The following is the complete list:

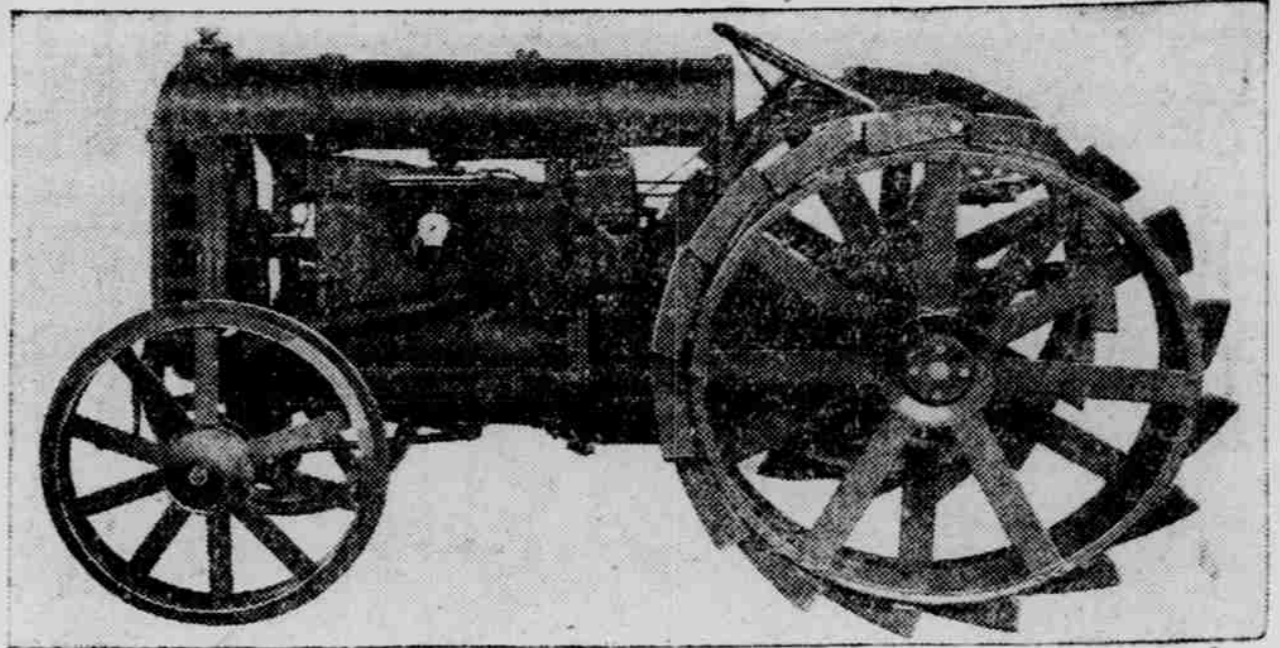
