To Treat Wheat For Smat Use the Following

To 10 gal. of water add one pint or pound of commercial formalin. 40 per cent solution of formaldehyde. Spread the grain on a clean floor or in a wagon box. Sprinkle

the solution over the grain, shoveling the grain over to be certain that the solution comes in contact with all the kernels. Then cover with old canvas or old blankets and leave covered from six to eight hours.

In case the grain is swollen it may be necessary to increase the feed of the drill to offset this and sow the proper amount. The drill should be disinfected with the above solution before used.

REGISTER.

National Registration Day. The law has not yet passed, the United States Senate, neither has the day of registration been set, but will be with the passage of the Man Power bill; so important does Provost Marshall Crowder consider this matter that he has called to his assistance the four minute men of the country in an endeavor to pass the word along.

Men between the ages of 18 and 29, inclusive and between 32 and 45, inclusive, who have not yet registered, will be required to do so under the new law. The date of registration will be furnished by telegraph, just as soon as the law passes the senate.
