

WAS KILLED BY HIS HORSES

WHILE RETURNING FROM WORK LAST EVENING CARL LOPP IS TRAMPLED TO DEATH.

FOUND IN THE WEEDS DEAD

Was Driving a Team and Riding Another Horse When the Trouble Came.

Last evening while Carl Lopp was returning from his work in the field which was some distance away, the horses which he had been using, in some way got into trouble, and in his endeavor to get them straightened out, they dragged him from the horse which he was riding, and dragged and trampled him to death by the roadside, about a half mile from his home. When the horses came to the house the folks hastened to find him, and found the body with life about extinct. Dr. Brendel of Murray was called but found that the unfortunate man had been dead for some time, though there was still some warmth in the body. Mr. Lopp and Miss Margaret Berner were married last spring, and had been farming during the summer, and he was at the farm work yesterday and was just returning home in the evening. The funeral will be held tomorrow at what hour is not known.
