Letter From Debarbation Hospital At Hampton, Va., Tells of Soldiers Arriving.

Hampton, Va., Dec. 5.
Dear Mother,
Your card of Nov. 26th received but as I have been down at Asheville, N. C. the last week, I did not get to write. The wounded men are coming in rapidly and we are working in the hospitals here. I worked one night from 7 p. m. to 7 a. m. and at 10:00 a. m. left on a hospital train with men that had been gassed, taking them to a hospital in the mountains, near Asheville, which is in the heart of the Blue Ridge mountains in North Carolina.
It was a nice trip, but it was work all the way so not much time to look at the scenery. We got back Monday and I have been working in a contagious ward since. However I don't think there will be any chance of getting away for a few months. I am in fine health and hope you are the same, also Dad and sister. Must get to work now so will close with more later.
