The hearing of the Omaha street railway controversy before the National War Labor board joint chairmen, William H. Taft and Basil M. Manly, was concluded at 5:45 p. m. yesterday, when Mr. Taft read the had dictated.

In brief the union feature of the controversy was held non-essential to the present controversy. The men were given redress on "short-piece" runs and lost their contention that night runs were arranged to avoid paying bonus. Further hearing on minimum wage complaints were arranged for February 1.

The taking of testimony in support of the grievances made by the carmen, and counter-testimony by the company, was started at 4:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon and was resumed at 9:00 o'clock vesterday morning, with a brief interval for noonday lunch.

The decision went against the carmen in the matter of night runs which the men charged had been arranged by the company to avoid 90 per cent of all the employes, ten the application of a bonus-pay feas dered a contract to the president of ture. The joint chairmen stated that vsied of the actual rulings of the examiners to pass on the minimum wage complaints. They held that the wage of 42 1/2 cents per hour, provided for in the board's award. was intended to apply to adult male employes, and added that it would require the attendance of the board's examiners to investigate and page on specific cases complained of.

With respect to short-piece runs. which are from six and a balf to seven and a half hours, the men complained that such a run does not yield sufficient compensation and requires employes to take tripper runs. This arrangement, the decision states, appeared to have been made to evade the bonus feature, and it was further stated by the chairmen that the company neglected the consideration of fair-

An amendment of this feature of the working conditions was directed to avoid injustice. If a conference between employes and company does not get results, it was suggested that the matter should be referred to the examiners.

"We think that due to the pride of the men in their union and organization, and the technical sensitiveness of the employer, many troubles have arisen that might have been completely avoided by a clear understanding of the view of the national war labor board in this

### NO PLANS MADE FOR UNI-VERSAL ARMY SERVICE

Secretary Baker Says Subject Awaits Peace-Hopes Army Need Not Remain for Two Years.

Washington, Jan. 3 .- No decision has been reached by the Wer department on the question of universal military service. Secretary Baker told he house military committee today, and he indicated that no definite projuct for a permanent military establishment would be presented to congress until the peace conference had concluded its work.

When asked whether it would be necessary to keep a large force in Europe for at least two years, the secretary said:

"We hope that is not true; we are not planning for it."

He said 700,000 men had been discharged from the army since the armistice was signed and that another million men would be discharged within the next five weeks.

## SOLDIERS WILL RECEIVE A DOUBLE WELCOME AT N. Y.

#### FRANCE PLANS TO TAKE OVERSIGHT OF ARMENIA IF ALLIES ARE WILLING
