

SAW HALF-CENTURY OF LIVING IN NEBRASKA

AND EVENT IS PROPERLY CELEBRATED BY FAMILIES OF THESE TWO MEN.

IN CASS COUNTY MOST OF TIME

George E. Buell and George E. Vandenberg Arrived in Omaha on January 23rd, 1869.

At the home of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. E. Buell, near Murdock, in Cass county, Nebraska, on Home Rest Farm, January 23rd occurred the celebration of the arrival in Nebraska fifty years ago of George E. Buell and George E. Vandenberg.

Mrs. Buell served a delicious four-course dinner to the following relatives: Mr. and Mrs. G. E. Vandenberg and son Edd; Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Cox; Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Buell and son, Noble; Mr. and Mrs. A. Rosenkötter and daughter Vera; Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Gortney and daughter, Dorothy, and sons Charlie and Fred Buell.

On January 11, 1869 these two young men, taking Horace Greeley's advice, left eastern New York, where they were boys together, for the unknown West.

They made a short stay in Ohio; then stopped in Iowa, where they could have bought land for \$6 an acre, but they did not have the \$6.

They arrived at Omaha on January 23, 1869. Their first work was at Bellevue, Nebraska, sawing wood for their board. Here they met their neighbor friend, S. W. Orton, now of Weeping Water, who had come from the same neighborhood a short time before.

They helped survey and make ties for the Omaha, South Western railroad, which is now the Burlington. They also saved wood for the first engines over that road in Nebraska. After this they came on to Cass county, where they settled on adjoining farms in 1869. Part of their land was preempted and part was deeded by Pres. Grant. The eighty acres on which the celebration was held was homesteaded by Mr. Buell and he has lived upon it ever since.

Their parents and grandparents had lived on adjoining farms in eastern New York since 1792.

These men have lived through the hardships of pioneer days and have also lived to see Nebraska develop from the one room shanty and the sod house, to the modern home with all of its conveniences also from the ox team (which they drove exclusively for the first four years) to the automobile—and aeroplane.

Some of the hardships of the early days were the grasshopper times and the drought of the early seventies.

Although the Indians and the buffaloes were scarce in this part of the state at that time, so also were the

trees and inhabitants. Nothing much but rolling prairie.

They sold corn and hauled it with oxen to Ashland for twelve cents a bushel, in trade and burned many bushels of corn for fuel.

They also sold and hauled wheat for 35 cents a bushel and hogs for \$2.00 a hundred to Plattsmouth, a distance of 27 cents.

Although neighbors lived far apart in those days, their sociability cannot be surpassed by that of the present time. So the early days were not all hardships; there was sunshine as well as shadows.

It has been the custom on Home Rest Farm on the 4th of July to hang out "Old Glory" and shoot an old flint lock gun that was made and carried by one of Mr. Buell's ancestors in the Revolutionary war. It was made in Colchester, Conn., in 1776. This gun also spoke on November 11, 1918 and January 23, 1919.

In Nebraska the period of the pioneer is past and yet we have some pioneers with us still. Yes, the pioneer days are past, but their witness are in our midst. It is well to recount their deeds while they are still among us.

WILSON'S POLICIES ARE DECLARED MOST AMAZING

REPUBLICANS VOICE OPPOSITION TO AGREEMENT BINDING U. S. TO HELP MAINTAIN ORDER IN OLD WORLD.

Washington, Jan. 31.—Vigorous opposition was voiced in the senate today by republican leaders to the plan for dealing with captured German colonies and occupied territories in Asiatic Turkey, which press dispatches from France yesterday said had been presented to the peace conference by President Wilson.

Democratic spokesmen said they could not believe reports that the president had proposed permanent internationalization of the territories and urged support of the American peace delegates. Some republican senators pointed out that the official communication issued by the conference said a plan for disposition had been provisionally agreed upon.

Critique Conference.

The debate continued for two hours and during its course republican leaders renewed their criticism of the plan for a league of nations, the delay in concluding peace with Germany, "secret diplomacy" and other questions connected with the peace conference. Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the republican leader, declared that statements in dispatches from special newspaper correspondents at Paris, that the United States would be required to help maintain order in the captured territories was "absolutely unbelievable."

Senator Knox of Pennsylvania asserted that the internationalization plan proposed "is stupendous and preposterous undertaking" while Senator Johnson of California declared he would not vote for a treaty requiring American troops to be sent to Asia or Africa. Senator Vandeman of Mississippi, democrat, suggested that the senate would reject such a treaty.

Doubts Paris Reports.

In reply to the republican attacks, Senator Lewis of Illinois, the democratic whip, said he doubted authenticity of the Paris reports and declared that disposition of the German colonies as suggested would violate the fundamental principle of self-determination of peoples. He said he believed the actual agreement merely was for temporary administration of the German colonies by the league of nations until their permanent status could be fixed.

Senator Walsh of Montana, democrat, said he could not believe the American commissioners would abdicate in the press dispatches.

Wants Mayo Disciplined.

United support for the American commissioners was urged by Senator Kirby of Arkansas, democrat, referring to Admiral Mayo's statement yesterday before the house naval committee that the league of nations was "rapidly getting down to a sewing circle." Senator Kirby

said if he were president, he would reduce Admiral Mayo in rank.

Would Stamp Out Bolshevism. New York, Jan. 31.—Asserting that the time had come "for a re-assertion of the American spirit and the calling of a halt to the doctrine of internationalism," Senator Miles Poindexter of Washington urged in an address here tonight at a dinner of the Republican club that the United States extricate itself as quickly as possible from European politics.

The government, he said, should meet every obligation it owes the allies in the fixing of the peace terms and should contribute its share of such armed force as is necessary "to stamp out, with fire and sword, bolshevism in Europe."

These tasks, completed, he declared, the nation should turn all its energies to the interests of America, which he said, lay wholly in the western hemisphere.

Asserting that the Monroe doctrine still is a vital and essential policy, Senator Poindexter declared that "violation by use of Europe's sphere of influence must necessarily be followed by Europe's violation of our sphere of influence."

GOAL PUT BACK ON ITS OLD BASIS TODAY

Price Control by Fuel Administration is Now a Thing of the Past—Up to the Dealers.

Washington, Jan. 31.—All price control exercised by the fuel administration over anthracite and bituminous coal and coke will cease tomorrow under a blanket order signed by Fuel Administrator Garfield and made public tonight. Zoning regulations and practically all rules for the distribution of fuel as well as most regulations concerning oil and natural gas promulgated under the Lever act as war measures, also are rescinded. Virtually little work for the fuel administration will remain when the order goes into effect, but officials said it would continue in operation until peace was formally declared and would keep a close watch on the fuel situation and if necessity arises restore any and all of the regulations which are rescinded at this time.
