BASIS LAID FOR PEACE TREATY IN THE ARMIS-TICE.

New Convention. Foch Says, Will Contain Clauses Concerning Financial and Territorial Questions.

Paris, Feb. 25 .- Marshal Foch. in discussing the diplomatic situation with a representative of the Havas agency, said the new armistice convention will provide for the naval and military disarmament of

He declared there was no doubt that the supreme council also would add to the new agreement clauses concerning financial and territorial questions.


