RECEIVES BROKEN ARM AND MANY CUTS OVER HEAD AND BODY, TAKEN TO HOSPITAL

From Saturday's Daily. Yesterday while working at the Sand Pit near Cedar Creek, Melvin B. Chamberlain became entangled in a cable which is used to transmit the power from the engine to the hoisting apparatus, in such a manner that he was thrown down and dragged, breaking one arm, and cutting his head and body in many places. Dr. Worthen was not at home at Louisville, and the doctor from Springfield was summoned, who hastened to the pit to render what assistance he could. He only gave first relief and the unfortunate man was taken shortly afterwards to Omaha via Ashland on the Schuyler train which passed there in a short time.

Mr. Chamberlain seems followed by ill fortune. Last year while he was coming from Versailles, Mo., in an immigrant car shipping his goods to this place, the car in which he was traveling was run into by another train, killing two mules and destroying much of his property, and bruising him up, crippling him for a number of months, this following makes his misfortunes greater. Nothing has been heard since his going to the hospital.
