**BOTH TEAMS MADE CHANGE IN PITCHERS**

THE NEW ALIGNMENT COULD NOT HOLD, THE OLD RELIABLES RECALLED.

**RED SOX WON HANDS DOWN**

Looked Like a Runaway At First But Became More Rigid Later In Game.

Johnson the wind-jammer and fun maker, who was the clown at the game a week ago yesterday and who promised to bring a team from St. Joseph which would trim the Red Sox 'just about right' according to what he said, did not materialize and a game was arranged between the Brown's Tennessee Rats and the Red Sox, the game being called a little late, with another line up in the visitors, which seemed with the exception of the pitcher a little better than the one of the week before. In the case of the Red Sox, Madden of Omaha was secured for the pitcher and was getting nowhere when the game looked like breaking to pieces on the rock. Stimpson who was doing excellent work on 1st base was placed in the box with all the bases filled and three balls to the credit of the striker. It did not look very good we can assure you, but felt that Stimpson could pull them out of the dilemma if anyone could and he did.
