TELEPHONE SERVICE IN WAR AND AFTER

Two years ago we had plenty of materials for telephone construction and enough trained employees. Then war came. Many of our highly trained men joined the colors. The maintenance of an efficient operating force became constantly more difficult because of the unusual demand for women employees in other lines of work. Equipment was hard to get. The government asked us to stop all but the most essential construction work. We gave the best telephone service during the war that conditions would permit, but it was not and could not be as good as has been previously enjoyed. We face today the period of reconstruction. Our old employees are gradually being released from military service and are resuming their old positions. Our equipment, weakened by two years of restricted construction will gradually be expanded and replaced. We cannot restore conditions to a pre-war standard in a few months, but our efforts are centered on improving the service, and it will steadily get better.

VISITED WITH FRIENDS HERE

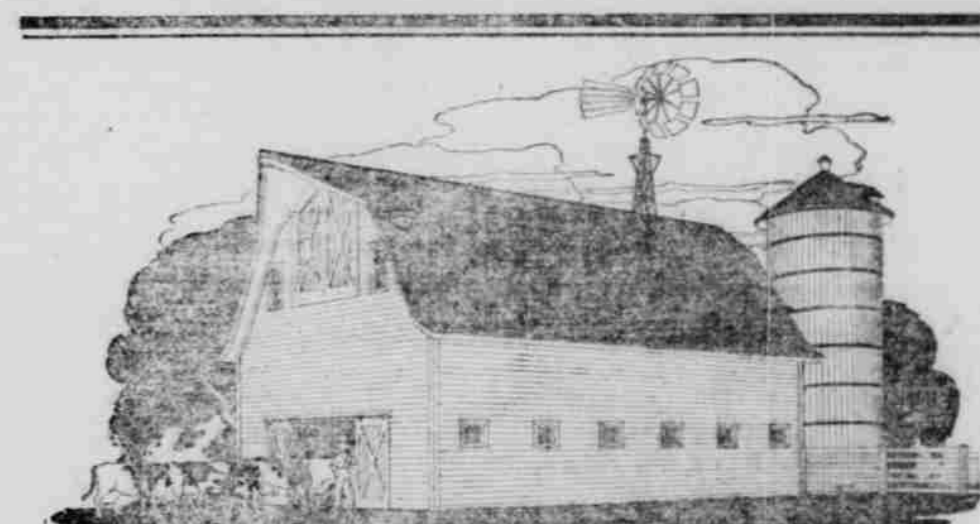
