

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE WELL ATTENDED

REGISTRATION ALMOST REACHES THE HUNDRED MARK ON THE OPENING DAY

GOOD INSTRUCTORS PROCURED

By County Superintendent Alpha Peterson—Teachers Exhibit Interest in Work.

From Tuesday's Daily. The Cass County Teachers Institute convened at the Plattsmouth High school building at 9:30 Monday morning. The attendance at the first session was very encouraging, considering the unfavorable weather conditions, and the interest and enthusiasm displayed by the Cass county teachers promise well for the schools of Cass county during the coming year.

Miss Peterson has spared no effort to arrange a most useful and at the same time entertaining program. She has chosen instructors with the best of training and experience, who are familiar with school problems and in sympathy with teachers and their problems.

Mr. Geo. W. Brown, head of the department of rural education at the Peru normal is presenting special work in arithmetic, grammar and language, and some more general lectures on school problems and rural education. In the latter talks any public spirited person would find much of interest. Mr. Brown, in attempting to show the relation of the school to society, quoted that "the school was born in the home, fostered by the church, supported by the state and demanded by the business world." He outlines the five following elements of every school, (1) the general public, (2) the directors, (3) the course of study, (4) the teachers, (5) the pupils. Mr. Brown is making a very forceful presentation of the social and economic importance of the school, its dependence upon general social organization and the reliance of the business world upon the school.

Miss Clara Hohl of Lincoln, has charge of primary work, and is doing excellent work in defining problems and outlining methods for primary teachers in reading, numbers and seat work. Miss Hohl is thoroughly familiar with children and child psychology, she is informed on all progressive educational movements and is bringing much valuable information to Cass county's teachers.

Miss Marie Kaufmann, supervisor of penmanship in the Plattsmouth schools needs no introduction in the county. She is a teacher of unusual discrimination, ability and experience; she is an especially capable penman and has accomplished marvelous results in her work in Plattsmouth. Miss Kaufmann is doing particularly valuable work in the institute since the importance of good training in penmanship is realized to be paramount.

Miss Helen Harp, who comes directly from a summer of special training in the University of Chicago is presenting some of the newest material on mental tests and standardized school tests. The work in standardized tests is one of the most progressive features of present educational developments. Many of

the tests are only in an experimental stage and it is important for all teachers to obtain information concerning them, and to make an effort to keep in touch with progress along this line through current educational literature.

Special features this morning were chorus singing led by Mrs. E. H. Wescott and reading by Miss Bernice Newell. Mrs. Wescott and her unusual musical talent are well known in Plattsmouth. She gave many valuable suggestions which will be practically helpful to public school teachers, and created a wonderfully responsive atmosphere during the few minutes she had with the teachers this morning.

Miss Newell's selections were especially appropriate and well rendered, and met with a most enthusiastic response from her audience.

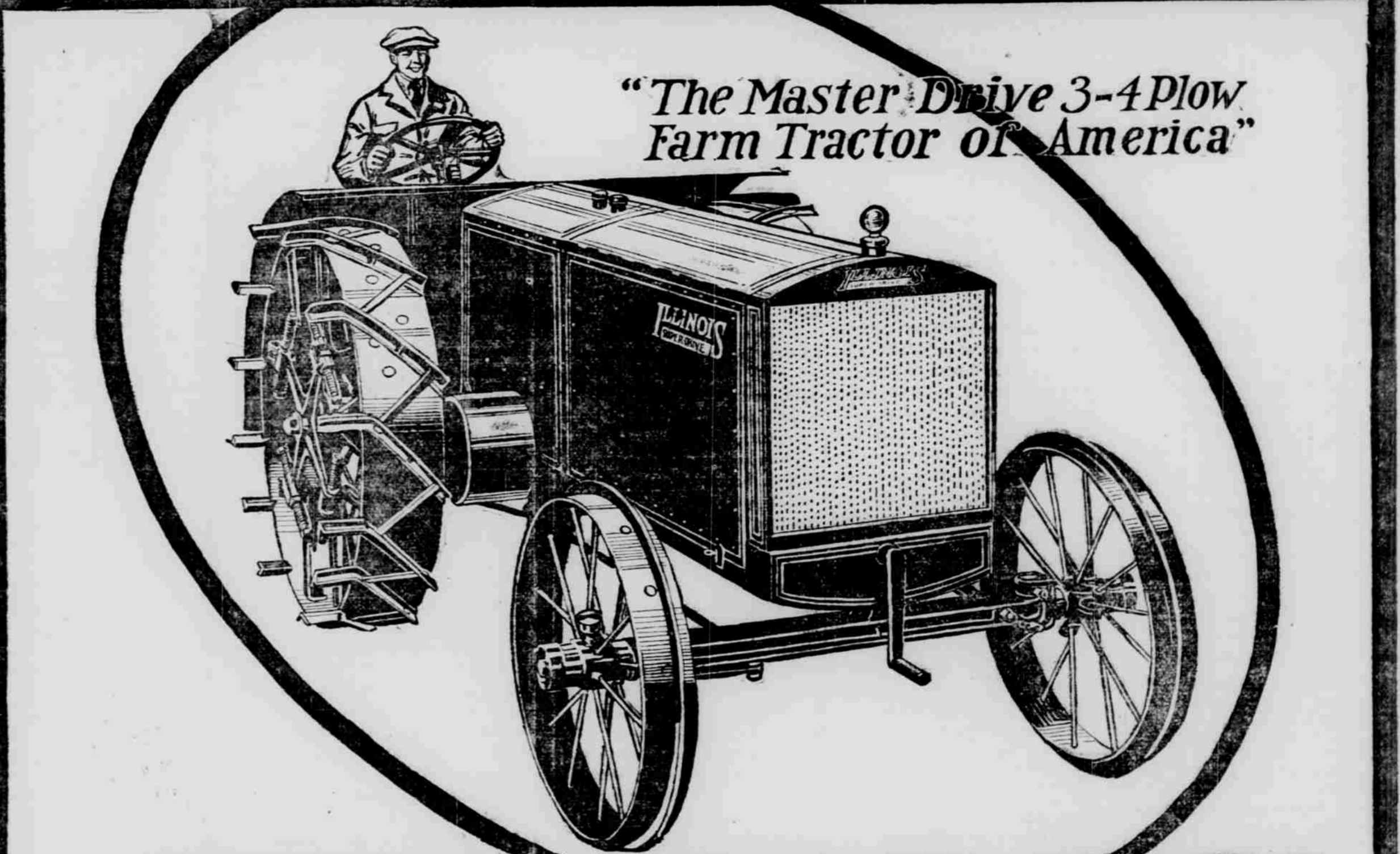
