**INSISTS ON NAME OF NEMAHA.**

Washington, Sept. 5.—Hull number 1,449, building at the Baltimore shipyards under the direction of the United States shipping board, was named the "Nemaha" several months ago in honor of the river and county in Nebraska bearing that name. Week before last one of the controlling officials of the shipping board who comes from South Carolina changed the name of the vessel to Forsythe in honor of the home county to the official mentioned. This change of name having been brought to Congressional Reavis' attention, he today took up the matter with the chief of the shipping board, protesting against the change and showing by comparison that Nemaha county, Nebraska, in liberty bonds, in war savings stamps and other war activities exceeded the South Carolina county by 500 per cent, and demanded that the name Nemaha be restored. The congressman from the First Nebraska district expects favorable action.

**FLYERS DROPPED FLOWERS IN PATH OF PRESIDENT**

**COLUMBUS GREET'S WILSON WITH ACCLAIM AS HE ARRIVES IN CITY.**

**Crowds Along Railroad Welcome His Special With Cheers.**

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 4.—Columbus today was garbed in her showiest fashion to greet President Wilson, who opened his countrywide speaking tour in behalf of the peace treaty and the league of nations.

A reception committee met the president at the Union station, and escorted him to an automobile which headed a procession of machines along downtown streets. Airplanes here with the all-American pathfinders outfit, flew over the line of march, dropping flowers in the path of the president's machine.

**Crowd Greets President.**

On Board President Wilson's Special Train, Sept. 4.—When the train stopped for a few minutes at Denison, Ohio, a number of Red Cross workers and some town folks were at the station, and the president came out on the platform of his car. He greeted the small crowd and chatted with the Red Cross workers for a moment.

An elderly, gray bearded man got in conversation with the president just before the train pulled out of Denison.

**Wishes Wilson Success.**

"I wish you success on your trip," he said. "It means a great deal to me. I lost two boys in the war and have only one left. I am looking to you to prevent future wars so he won't have to go."

Another man in the crowd reminded the president that Denison had voted against him in the last presidential election, but would be for him in 1920.

"Oh no," replied the president laughing and shrugging his shoulders.

**WON'T STOP SEIZURE OF PORK BY STATE**

Canton, O., Sept. 4.—Justice William R. Day of the United States supreme court here today denied a writ asking for a stay of execution in the case of the state of Ohio against the Columbus Packing company in which seventy-five tons of pork, said to have been held in violation of the law, was seized by the prosecuting attorney of Franklin county. It is said the pork will be placed on the market and sold at once.
