### OMAHA MAN SUSTAINS SEVERE FALL

George Krymes Slipped when Aighting from Steps of No. 14 Here Last Evening.

Last evening as No. 14 drew up at the platform at the Burlington station, the bystanders on the platform were startled as the form of a man fell from one of the vestibules of the train and struck the platform and lower step of the train with great force. The injured man was at once assisted to an automobile and hurried to the office of the Burlington surgeon where an examination was made of his injuries. The man proved to be George Krymes of Omaha, who was coming to this city to look up some of his old army friends, and the accident as he tells it occurred when the unfortunate man started to alight from the train and as he started to step off the heel of his shoe caught in the metal work of the top step which Mr. Krymes states was slightly loose and as a result he was thrown down the steps and fell striking his back against the lower step with great force and bruising himself very badly although it is not thought that any bones were broken in the fall. The injured man was later taken to the Perkins house, where he is now resting up from the accident.

Mr. Krymes has returned from France only a few weeks ago and as he had not definitely settled down to work decided to come to Plattsmouth and look up a number of the former members of the machine gun company of the 6th Nebraska national guard, with whom he served prior to being sent to France, but his trip proved rather unfortunate for him as it will result in his being laid up for several days. Prior to his entry into the army in 1917, Mr. Krymes was engaged in the restaurant business in Omaha, being located on South 13th street. He arrived in Omaha from abroad about three weeks ago and has since been spending his time in Omaha looking over a suitable location for a good chef or restaurant man and having heard of Plattsmouth from his army friends, decided to come here, meeting with the severe accident as related.
