IMPEACHMENT LIKELY IN CASE OF DAKOTANS

GOVERNOR FRAZIER OF NORTH DAKOTA RECOMMENDS INQUIRY BE MADE.

TOWNLEY IN TROUBLE AGAIN

Supreme Judge Says Message to the Lawmakers Creates Precedent—Urges Tax Reduction

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 25.—Governor Lynn J. Frazier, in his message to the special session of the state legislature today, recommended that the legislature "appoint a committee of five to investigate the illegal and improper expenditures of state funds and illegal accounts of public officials."

The governor's recommendations were taken to indicate that the session would not be "brief and harmonious." Governor Frazier's recommendations are aimed at Secretary of State Carl Kostitzky and Attorney General William Langer. These state officials were elected with the support of the Nonpartisan league, but for several months they have been leaders of the faction opposed to the majority league factions, which is headed by President A. C. Townley.

"A determined effort has been made by some few obstructionists to delay and prevent the putting into operation and the carrying out of the industrial program enacted by you at the last session," said Governor Frazier in his message. The three state officials, who probably will be defendants in impeachment proceedings as a consequence of the governor's recommendations, have vigorously opposed some of the industrial laws which were enacted at the last session.

Governor Frazier also urged the legislature to investigate election frauds, ratification of the federal suffrage amendment, increased compensation for returned soldiers, state endorsement of the proposed green waterway from the Great Lakes to the St. Lawrence river and creation of an office of state sheriff.

Fifty per cent reduction of all tax levies in North Dakota was urged by Associate Justice J. E. Robinson of the state supreme court in a message, and bills presented today at the opening of the state legislature. The message was said to be the first ever presented to the state legislature by a jurist.

A general law, with an emergency clause, was suggested by Justice Robinson as a means to accomplish the proposed decrease.

WILL NOT REPUDIATE BOND DEBTS

Martens Declares Soviet Government Will Settle the Loans Made to Imperial Russia.

New York, Nov. 25.—The bolsheviks do not intend to repudiate the \$100,000,000 worth of bonds issued by the imperial provisional government of Russia, as reported, according to Ludwig C. A. Martens, self-styled soviet ambassador to the United States.

Testifying Tuesday at a hearing held by the joint legislative committee investigating radicalism in this state, Martens asserted that although the soviet government has been authorized by the all-Russian congress of soviets to repudiate obligations contracted in preceding regimes, it did not intend to take advantage of this permission.

Instead, Martens testified, his government had sent him official authorization to arrange for a settlement on outstanding bonds, a large proportion of which were sold in this country. He did not explain on what basis a settlement could be effected. He said he hoped to arrange a settlement not only in the case of bonds on which interest will come due next June but also in the case of others on which interest has been defaulted.

Before calling Martens before them, members of the committee held an executive session at which it was decided to submit to the state department a transcript of his testimony with a view of having him deported. During a discussion of communist principles, Martens said that Lenin and Trotzky had receded somewhat
