NEW MILL AT CORNER OF THIRD AND PEARL STREETS NEAR COMPLETION.

NEW METHODS TO BE USED

Most Modern Construction Throughout and Will Make Very Fine Showing for the City.

The mill has a total dimension of 32x173 feet and is three stories in height and arranged in an ideal manner for the purpose that it is intended.
