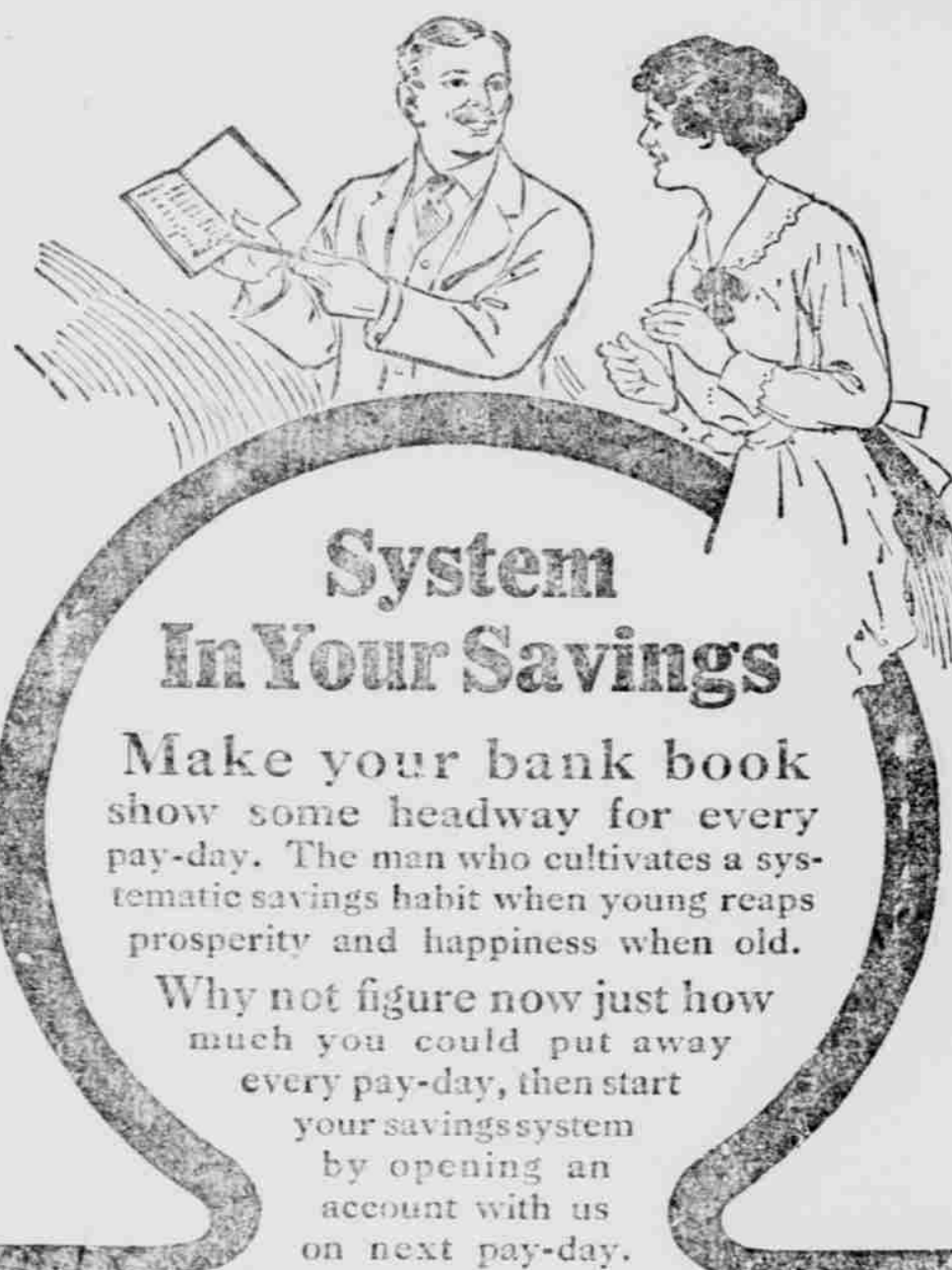

## JAMES DE LES DERNIER—BRIEF SKETCH

Lifelong Resident of County and Respected Neighbor and Friend is Laid to Rest at Nehawka.

The community has lost a valuable citizen and the family a loving husband and father in the passing of James De Les Dernier of Murray, who was laid to his last long rest on Saturday, November 29. The funeral services were held from the late home and were conducted by Rev. W. A. Taylor of Union and the body laid to rest in the St. Pleasant cemetery.

James De Les Dernier was born near Nehawka, Nebraska, March 13, 1870. After a brief illness he departed from this life on November 26, 1919, at the St. Joseph hospital of Omaha.

Mr. De Les Dernier comes of one of the old and highly respected families of the county and his ancestry dates from several generations of the French and Scotch pioneers who settled in Canada and later came to the United States and located here in Nebraska where they assisted in the developing of the country. The deceased made his home near Nehawka up until about 10 years ago when he moved to the farm near Murray where he resided until death called him to his final reward. On March 22, 1892, he was united in marriage to Miss Eugenia Hebeck and to this union was born five children, Ray, Ivan, Ida and Elva Riens.

During his brief illness he suffered greatly, but remained conscious until the last. Although a believer in the Christian faith he never identified himself with any organization, but died accepting the Christ as his personal Savior.

He was a kind and loving husband and father and a good neighbor and a gentleman held in the highest esteem by all with whom he had come in contact. Besides the wife and children he leaves to mourn his loss three brothers, Richard De Les Dernier, Elmwood; Norman De Les Dernier, Union; and J. T. De Les Dernier, Alva, as well as a host of other relatives and friends. His parents and two sisters having preceded him to the better land.
