Completion of Government Aid Road South of City Brings Contractor to Meet With Commissioners.

This morning a profound quiet and peace reigned over the court house with only a few matters of clerical work occupying the attention of the clerks and officials as the storm of the past two days has effectively closed all travel in and out of the city.

The county commissioners were the only exception to the restful condition of affairs prevailing as the board was holding an informal meeting with Edward Peterson of Omaha, the contractor on the government aid road south of the city. The work on the road has been completed and the contractor is having the small details of the world cleared up and adjusting the expenses and cost of the construction. There seems to be some difference as to the payment due for grubbing stumps out of the new roadway. The amount involved is in the neighborhood of \$5,000 and who is to pay this sum is the chief object of the gathering of the commissioners and the contractor.
