## ONE OF THE GRAND OLD MEN OF NEBRASKA

CAPT. ISAAC WILES VISITING OLD HOME IS EXAMPLE OF SPLENDID TYPE OF PIONEERS.

### CAME HERE IN THE FIFTIES

Pre-Empted Homestead Near This City in 1856 and Resided Here Up to Two Years Ago.

The history of the state of Nebraska is filled with many rugged and sturdy men who coming west in the territorial days made their home in this community and by their strong and forceful character assisted materially in the building up of the then unsettled country into one of the leading states of the union. Such a type of man is Captain Isaac Wiles, who now fast nearing the ninetieth milestone of life is as keen and active as many men of far less years, and enjoying his life each day as only a man who has accomplished a well spent life can do. Captain Wiles has made his home for the past two years in the western portion of the state with his son, E. M. Wiles, residing at Minatare and he is now back in the old home visiting with his son, Luke L. Wiles, and his daughters, Mrs. J. H. Hall of this city, Mrs. Major Hall of Pacific Junction and Mrs. B. B. Dean of Glenwood, as well as his son, T. F. Wiles of Omaha, and the visit here is the commencement of a long and pleasant vacation that Mr. Wiles is planning in visiting with his children. He is to meet his son, Ray Wiles of St. Louis, here and accompany him to the Missouri city for a visit and then expects to start westward to visit again the scenes where as a youth he joined the horde of seekers for the golden arroyos of California and will spend some time with his daughter, Mrs. Ursula Ervitt at Spokane, Wash. It was in 1852 that Isaac Wiles, then in the first flush of manhood made the trip across the great continent of North America to seek fortune and adventure in the new land that the gold seeker had given to world on the Pacific slope of the United States and the long trip was made with a company driving herds of cattle. It is interesting to hear this splendid old gentleman relate the wonderful days on the coast where the rule of might was that of right and the doctrine of the popular will the only law that held sway from the Rockies to the Pacific. On his return from the gold fields where he failed to find the promised fortune Mr. Wiles made the trip by way of Panama, but then no great canal offered easy passage to the boats but the trip across the isthmus was by way of the pioneer railroad and stages which were crowded with those going and coming from California and from there an ocean voyage of a month awaited the traveler to New York.

Falling to locate in California the promised fortune this hardy youth

came westward again and decided to bring from the virgin soil of the west the promised fortune he sought and located in Cass county making his homestead at the outskirts of Plattsmouth in 1856 and the old homestead still stands as a monument to the untiring spirit of the pioneer, who there found realization of his hopes. Through the times of territorial days and in the dangers of the Indian invasions Captain Wiles bore his part with bravery and courage and his service in the army in the opposing of the Indians developed and strengthened his character and fitted him for the later days of life. It is now in the sunset of life, when the shadows have begun to lengthen out their eastward course, that this worthy citizen and friend is enjoying to the fullest extent the heritage that he has wrought out of the wilderness for himself and his family and his days are full of pleasure as he goes from one to another of those whom he brought into the world and prospered in the material things of life, taking the fullest measure of happiness as he prepares his way for the dawning of a brighter day, whose rays of hope lighten the heart of the weary traveler along the long and roughened way of life.

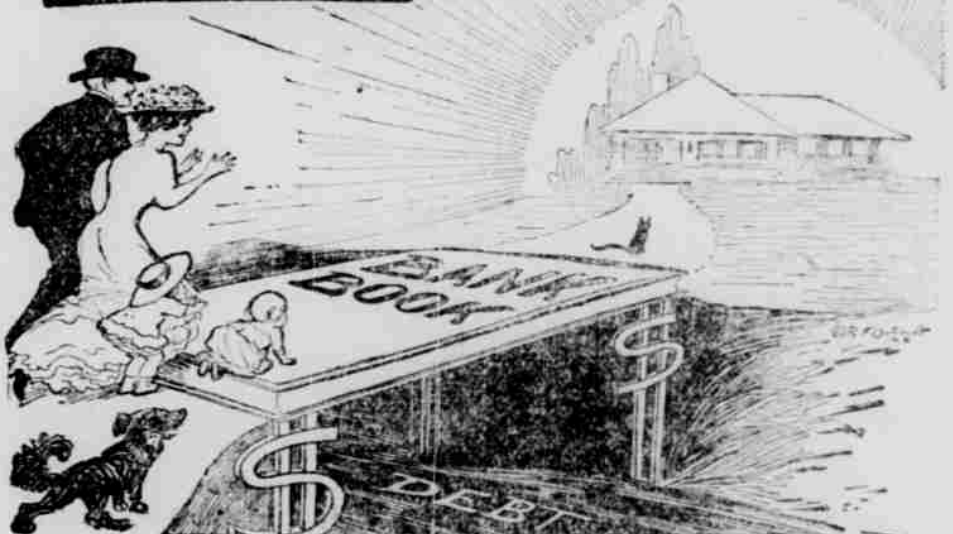
