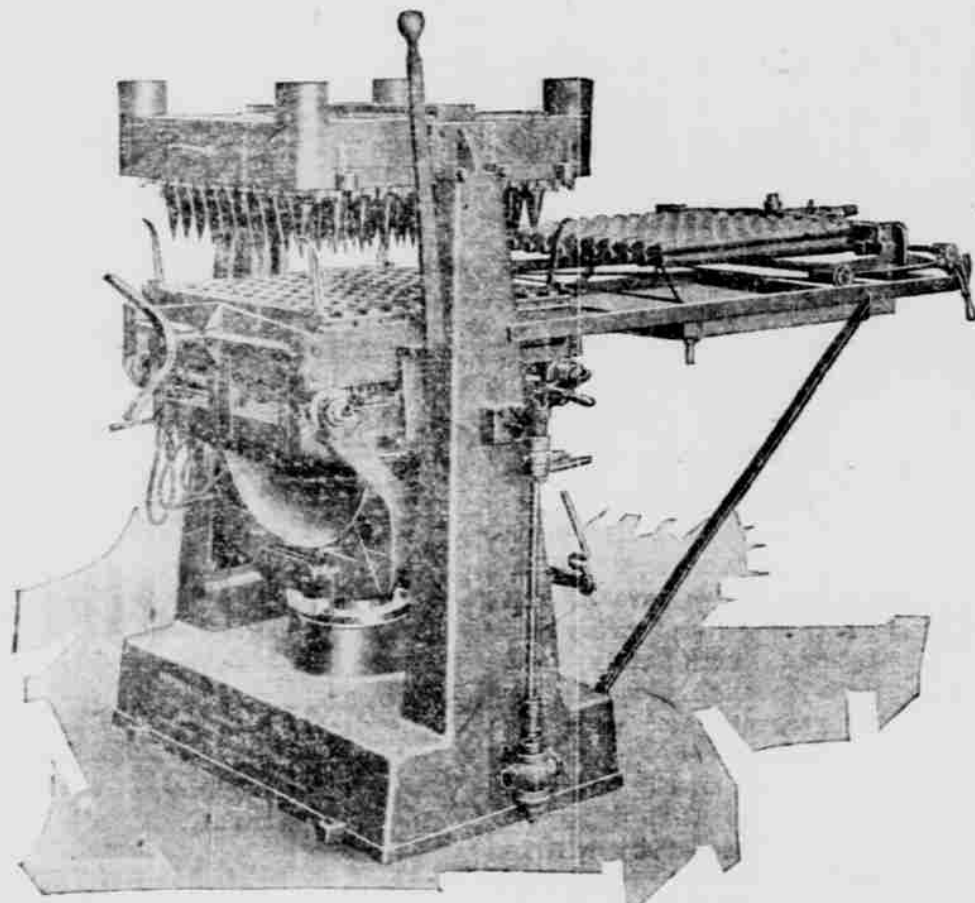

PLATTSMOUTH PLANT HANDLES A BIG LOAD

Local Power House of Nebraska Gas & Electric Co. Carries Load for Eight Towns in Emergency.

The wisdom of the equipping of the power house of the Nebraska Gas & Electric company in this city to care for a part of the service of the company was borne out yesterday when a breakdown in the main plant at Omaha made it necessary for the Plattsmouth plant to carry the load for five towns for the greater part of the day. The transmission lines east of the Missouri river including Glenwood and a number of the other Iowa towns could not be handled from Omaha and the matter was put up to the Plattsmouth plant to carry the load and for almost the entire day the small plant here served the patrons of the company with light and power. The local plant has the Murray and Union lines as well as the Plattsmouth service to handle every day and in addition to these was hooked onto the Iowa lines and with this heavy load was able to keep the service up which is a very pleasing showing for the local plant here.

AMENDMENTS HIT JUDGES

Under the provisions of proposed constitutional amendments Nos. 81 and 82, by Nye of Buffalo and Olson of Council Bluffs, providing for the election of judges of the supreme court by district, it is alleged Judges Rose, Letton and Aldrich would not be eligible for re-election in 1922 because the proposals provide for elections of judges in districts 1, 3 and 6 and 1, 4 and 6 in that year. The terms of these judges do not expire in 1922 and if they would be eligible for re-election then they would be obliged to resign. There are no judges on the supreme bench who reside in the Second or Third congressional districts. The terms of Judges Cornish, Sedgewick and Dean expire in 1922. Judge Dean lives in the sixth district, or retains his legal residence there. Judges Rose, Aldrich and Letton maintain legal residence in Lincoln and in the first district. Judges Cornish and Sedgewick are said to have told friends they did not intend to be candidates for re-election. The provisions of the proposed amendments to the constitution offered by Nye and Olson have not yet been digested by the committee on judicial department.
