NEBRASKANS CLEAN UP ON A BIG DEAL

Inter-Sea Service Company, in Which Number of Cass County Men Are Interested Has Been Sold.

T. O. Warfield of Omaha, secretary of the Inter-Sea Service corporation, composed in the greater part of stockholders in the eastern portion of Nebraska, announced that this company had sold a large part of their land holdings in Kansas and Oklahoma to a syndicate of New York bankers for approximately \$1,500,000.

Among the property sold is an 80-acre tract in Kansas which was purchased by the Inter-Sea corporation a few months ago for \$25,000 and which was disposed of to the New York financiers for \$500,000. This property is now producing 400 barrels of oil a day.

In the Inter-Sea company there are a number of Cass county men listed as stockholders and have realized a nice money on their holdings in the deal just closed. G. W. Cheary and J. M. Patterson of Union, George T. Sheldon and Julian J. Pollard of Nebraska are among those from Cass county who are interested in the company.

TO HONOR RELATIVES OF FALLEN HEROES

French Government to Issue Certificates of Honor to Relatives of American Dead in War.

As a token of appreciation, the French government has prepared a beautifully engraved certificate of honor which will be presented to the nearest relatives of the men who died in the great war. These certificates are to be distributed on Washington's birthday, February 22, 1920.

In order to get them to the kin of the soldiers, sailors and marines and that suitable ceremonies may be arranged, the war department has arranged with the American Legion to co-operate with recruiting officers. Local posts throughout Nebraska have been asked to give their aid toward this end, and to list all the nearest relatives of the men who died who entered the service from the post's respective community.

Many Legion posts in the state have already started to work on this matter, and are arranging elaborate ceremonies. City officials and welfare organizations have been asked to aid the Legion in getting this matter before the public and impressing upon them the sacred appreciation which the French people desire to bestow upon their fellow soldiers.

"We all should give this matter our hearty support," stated Earl M. Miller, commander of the Legion in Nebraska. "We should have a ceremony that will bring before us all the fine feeling of friendship that exists between France and America, and that will mean to France to have had the aid and services of the comrades who did not return. This is a good opportunity for us to honor them for their noble achievements."

FARMERS UNION ELECTS OFFICERS

Meeting at Weeping Water is Well Attended and Interest Shown by All Delegates.

The Cass County Farmers' union held their annual meeting in Weeping Water on December 22. Officers elected for the ensuing year were H. L. Shoemaker of Union, president; M. E. Haffour of Nehawka, secretary-treasurer; Mr. Towle of Weeping Water, vice president; George and Henry Oshlerking and Andy Stelman, directors.

Threatening weather and condition of the roads prevented a very large turnout, but there was present a fairly good representation of the 26 locals in the county.

Weeping Water local was highly complimented in their erection of the big fireproof warehouse, and the 26 locals in the county have pledged themselves to give it their patronage whenever possible to do so in the way of food, feed stuffs, machinery and implements. The many justifications over the state like this one have made possible the big Farmers' Union State Exchange in Omaha, which is incorporated for \$2,000,000, owned and controlled by over 10,000 farmers' union members in the state.

Dick Kneeter was elected delegate to the state convention to be held in Omaha on January 13 and the president is to act on the legislative committee representing Cass county.

The next regular meeting is the second Monday in March. The membership is looking forward to the meeting with a great deal of interest for there is stated two questions for debate, one being the question of consolidating schools. The contest is between the locals and a prize is to be given the winning side.

Those present from Farmers' Union elevators in the county show the same interest as other counties in the new company recently organized called the Nation Co-operative company, the object of this company being to buy a seat on the Great Eastern in Omaha and later in Kansas City and Chicago, and also to build their own terminal elevator facilities.

WOMEN OF ILLINOIS SMITING HIGH PRICES

Seventy Thousand Reorganized to Boycott Foodstuffs That Are Marked Up

Chicago, Dec. 23.—Reorganization of Illinois women to combat the high cost of living today was given impetus by the state fair price commission for driving down in two days the retail selling price of fresh eggs from 77 cents to 65 cents a dozen.

"Watch them smite some more and butter, potatoes, high priced coffee and the other high flyers with them," said Major A. A. Sprague, chairman of the commission. "We now will eat fresh eggs again" he added. "No longer will buy a fresh egg at 75c a dozen. Seventy thousand women have joined the first smite high prices."

Gift of Christmas Trees.
Christmas trees today sold for as little as 5 cents. "Take your pick" in some places, and ranged up to \$1.75 with the evergreens still a drug on the market. Reluctance of local representatives of Santa Claus to buy the 10 first demanded one only, but others down the price but resulted in an 800 trees being distributed from last night and an additional two carloads being offered today.

THINK AGREEMENT ON PEACE TREATY TO COME

Washington, Dec. 23.—Although republican and democratic senators continued their conference today on peace treaty reservations, there were no concrete results and leaders said they expected none for some days. There was a feeling, however, that by the time the holiday recess ends January 5, the basis for an agreement will have been reached.

Details of proposed changes in the reservations framed by the senate majority at the last session were talked over by Senator Lodge, Massachusetts, the republican leader, and Senator Taft of Wisconsin, a leader of the wild reservation group of republicans. They said the conference was of a retinal nature and that no final agreement on peace treaty was reached.
