OFFICE OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS of Cass County.

Plattsmouth, Neb., Jan. 13, 1920. Board met in regular session, present C. F. Harris, H. J. Miller, Julius A. Pitz, County Commissioners and Geo. R. Sayles, County Clerk. Minutes of last session read and approved with the following business transacted in regular form:

County Physician

Clerk reported that applications had been filed for appointment as County Physician by Dr. F. W. Kruse and Dr. B. P. Brendel.

On motion by Pitz the Board proceeded to vote for county physician for the year 1920, the result of the ballot being two for Dr. Brendel and one for Dr. Kruse. Dr. B. P. Brendel was declared to be the appointee for County Physician for 1920.

Supt. of County Farm

Application of J. H. Tams to be appointed superintendent of the Cass county farm for the year ending in March, 1921, considered and the Board voted to appoint said J. H. Tams and fixed the salary at \$1,500 per year.

Damage Claim by Clark

In the matter of the claims of Charles Clark and Clarissa Clark against the County of Cass for damages received on September 5, 1919, caused by automobile going through a defective bridge on the O street road near Eagle, in Cass county, Charles Clark agreed to accept \$75 in full and Clarissa Clark agreed to

accept \$175 in full payment for said damages. The Board approved the agreement and ordered payment of damages to the said parties in the amounts as stipulated.

Plattsmouth, Neb., Jan. 14, 1920. Board met as per adjournment. Present, all members, and the following business was transacted in regular form:

County Highway Commissioner

Board took up the matter of appointing a County Highway Commissioner and on motion proceeded to ballot on the following list of candidates who had filed applications for the appointment:

Fred Patterson, Plattsmouth, Neb. E. Blanchard, David City, Neb. Frank Gustin, Elmwood, Neb. Kenneth Y. Craig, Plattsmouth. C. F. Vallery, Plattsmouth. Wm. Atchison, Elmwood.

The first ballot resulted as follows: Gustin, one vote; Craig, one vote; Vallery, one vote. The second ballot resulted three votes for Vallery. Motion by Pitz that C. F. Vallery be declared appointed as County Highway Commissioner for the year 1920 and the salary be fixed at \$1,200 per year; also 10 cents per mile for traveling expense and also \$200.00 additional per year for depreciation in value of car. The motion carried unanimously.

Resolution

On motion, the following Resolution was passed by unanimous vote of the Board:

Whereas, The Department of Public Works of the State of Nebraska has proposed to furnish equipment and grade the state highways within Cass county, and

Whereas, Said Department of Public Works proposes to do said work at the actual cost of operating the grading equipment plus the repairs, without any charges for depreciation or rent of equipment;

Therefore, Be it Resolved, That we request the Department of Public Works to grade Highways Nos. 24 and 29, described as follows:

Road 24 from road 11 to junction with road 20.

Road 29 from west line to south line of county.

Be it Further Resolved, That the Department of Public Works be requested to pay the actual cost of operating grading equipment, plus repairs, out of Cass county's appropriation of the State Highway fund.

Be it Further Resolved, That all said work be done under the direction of the County Highway Commissioner, subject to the approval of the Division Engineer of the Department of Public Works. (Signed) C. F. HARRIS, H. J. MILLER, JULIUS A. PITZ.

Board of County Commissioners. Contract for Trucks
