PASS COMPROMISE WET GOODS BILL

New Jersey Assemblymen Approve Measure Calling for Drink of 3 1/2 Per Cent Alcohol.

Trenton, N. J., Feb. 24.—Amid scenes of tumult and cries for recognition by members of the floor after two hours' debate, the New Jersey house of the assembly late this afternoon passed a compromise "wet" bill fixing 3 1/2 per cent alcohol by volume which is declared to be slightly stronger than the 2.75 beer of war time prohibition days at the legal limit for beverages in New Jersey. The bill was agreed to by wet democrats and wet republicans and had the sanction of Governor Edwards. It was presented to the house in the form of a committee substitute for the Barrett 4 per cent bill which was the democratic measure and it was passed by a vote of 27 to 21.

The passage of the bill today was prompted by the desire of Attorney General McCrane to have the measure on the statute books in order to fortify him in his proposed action before the United States supreme court text Monday to upset the prohibition amendment and the Volstead act, which proceedings he has been directed to institute by Governor Edwards, who was elected on a distinctly wet issue.

It is believed that the senate will pass the bill.

TO FILL VACANCY IN THE CABINET

President Wilson Expected to Announce Today Successor to Secretary Lansing.

Washington, Feb. 24.—President Wilson is expected to announce tomorrow his selection of a successor to Robert Lansing as secretary of state. White house officials, in saying tonight that announcement of the appointment might be expected within the next 24 hours, refused to discuss the question of whom the president had agreed upon. The names of Frank L. Polk, secretary ad interim since the resignation of Mr. Lansing ten days ago after a disagreement with the president over the calling of cabinet meetings, and previously under-secretary of state, continues to be mentioned most prominently for the portfolio.

Speculation as to the possibility of Mr. Polk's selection takes cognizance of the fact that he understands thoroughly the Adriatic question, the most pressing matter now engaging the attention of the state department. Also the appointment of under-secretary as secretary would be in line with the policy followed when Mr. Lansing, then holding an office corresponding to that occupied by Mr. Polk, was made secretary after William J. Bryan resigned. Possibility of the transfer of Newton D. Baker from the war department to the state department also continued to be discussed today, along with probability that Mr. Wilson might go outside his official family to choose a new secretary.

U. S. EXPECTS TO COLLECT BILLION MORE IN TAXES

Washington, Feb. 23.—Collection of at least \$1,000,000,000 additional income and war profit taxes is expected by internal revenue officials to result from an audit of the consolidated tax returns of affiliated corporations. Seven hundred expert accountants and 600 clerks will be employed.

Funds for perfecting the accounting organization are provided in the legislative appropriation bill now before the house. Revenue officials say no fraud is involved, that it is simply a case of errors in calculations.

Already 200 of the 14,500 returns of this class have been audited and show additional taxes of \$41,600,000.
