LONG CONTESTED CASE NOW ENDED

Mandate From Supreme Court in Case of Emma Kaufmann Palmer vs. T. E. Parmele Closes Case

One of the longest contested cases that has been before the district preme court at Lincoln denied a new trial in the case of Emma Kaufmann judgment and costs of the case which will run from \$7,000 to \$8,000.
