## THREE BISHOPS OF M. E. CHURCH CHOSEN

Blake, Chicago, East Copenhagen; Bickley, Philadelphia, New Methodist Heads.

Des Moines, Ia., May 18.—Three men were elected bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church on the eleventh general conference ballot taken at noon. They are: Anton East, Copenhagen; Edgar Blake, Chicago, and George H. Bickley, Philadelphia. A total of fifty white bishops now have been elected and three more are to be chosen.

Eight hundred and twenty-two ballots were cast, making 548 necessary to elect. The vote was as follows: Anton East, 595; Edgar Blake, 581; George H. Bickley, 578. The three highest candidates, in addition to those elected, are as follows: F. T. Keeney, Syracuse, N. Y., 516; H. L. Smith, Detroit, 502; and C. L. Mead, Beaver, 453.

Dr. W. C. Burns of Minneapolis was elected a bishop on the fifth ballot taken last evening the result of which was announced today. The sixth ballot resulted in none being elected. The eighth ballot was taken on this evening and the result will be announced tomorrow.

Des Moines, Ia., May 18.—Effectiveness of the legislation passed at the conference was passed upon in a report of the judiciary committee today, in which it was the ruling that legislation of the session is not effective until adjournment. Opposition to lynching was ex-

pressed in the report of the committee upon the state of the church, and the federal government and the several states were "requested to take effective and vigorous methods by strict enforcement of more stringent laws where necessary to stamp out the brutal and vicious practice of lynching.

Reports five, seven and eight of the Episcopal committee were adopted. Number five was a reply to memorials asking that the appointive power of the bishops be placed in the hands of a minority of the district superintendents. The committee recommended nonconcurrent which was adopted.

No term of years for bishops was granted under report number 7, which also was adopted without debate.

Central conferences in southeastern Asia, Latin America, and South Africa were ordered established through the adoption of three reports from the committees on foreign missions introduced by Titus Lowe of Omaha.

A member "in good standing" in the Methodist Episcopal church is one against whom there is no formulated complaint or charge, and a minister has no right to withhold a certificate of membership unless such complaint or charge has been filed or the minister has knowledge that such is to be filed, in the opinion of the judiciary committee, the report of which was adopted.

## DEMONSTRATIONS BY DEMOCRATS OF STATE

CONVENTION RISES EN MASSE AND CHEERS AT MENTION OF SEN. HITCHCOCK'S NAME

Democrats of Nebraska last night in state convention, in which the entire Bryan delegation from Lancaster county was seated, unanimously endorsed President Wilson's advocacy of the peace treaty and of the League of Nations. They called upon the senate to ratify the treaty without nullifying treaty reservations and condemned the republican senators who have opposed such action. They commended the democratic senators who have upheld President Wilson in his hard fight for ratification.

In addition, the convention adopted a resolution introduced by former Governor Keith Neville, praising Senator Hitchcock for his "able and loyal leadership in the senate on behalf of the covenant of the League of Nations and support of our president in his noble efforts to establish permanent peace and good will among nations."

The resolution also calls upon the Nebraska delegation to the national convention to give its loyal and undivided support to Senator Hitchcock for the nomination for president in accordance with the primary mandate.

**Thanks by Hitchcock.**

Senator Hitchcock, as chairman of the committee of resolutions, after the adoption of the platform, thanked the democrats of Nebraska for their stand, declaring it would be spread over the entire nation that the party of Nebraska has "upheld without qualification the great president of the United States."

"When the San Francisco convention meets this issue," declared the senator, "I have no doubt the action then will be no more equivocal than yours has been now."

The appearance of Senator Hitchcock before the convention yesterday at all sessions brought demonstrations in his honor. When he walked to his place in the Douglas county delegation the convention applauded. When Chairman Shallenberger mentioned him as a leader in the senate and expressed the hope he would be nominated for president at San Francisco, the delegates rose, cheering for several minutes. This was repeated with even more enthusiasm as he gave the report of the resolutions committee, and later when the Neville resolution of endorsement was presented, the delegates again voiced shouts of acclaim.

**Hitchcock Indorsed.**

Ex-Governor Keith Neville's resolution offered from the floor, indorsing Senator Hitchcock, was as follows:

"Resolved, by the democracy of Nebraska in state convention assembled, that we heartily indorse the splendid record of our senator, Gilbert M. Hitchcock, as a democrat, a statesman and a patriot during the period he has represented our state in the national congress, and particularly do we commend and thank him for his able and loyal leadership in the senate in behalf of the covenant of the League of Nations and support of our president in his noble effort to establish permanent peace and good will among nations. Be it further

"Resolved, that the vote of the democrats of Nebraska in the primaries on April 29, in support of Gilbert M. Hitchcock for the democratic nomination for president meets our unqualified approval and that it is the sense of this convention that Nebraska's delegation to the national convention give its loyal and undivided support to Senator Hitchcock for the nomination, in accordance with the primary mandate."

**Profiteering Condemned.**

The platform adopted, aside from features bearing on national questions, condemns profiteering; declares for the 8-hour day for labor and collective bargaining; expresses the hope women soon may have the full right to vote in the United States; favors child labor laws, cooperation for production between producer and consumer; condemns the mutilation of the state primary law by the last legislature and advocating repeal of the offending amendments; opposes abuse of the parole law of the state, and indorses the candidacy of John H. Morshead for governor.

A resolution passed offered by Frank Warner of Norfolk, calls attention to the services of the soldier and asks the national convention to take up the matter of giving them necessary relief by the enactment of suitable laws.

The convention yesterday seated the Bryan delegation of Lancaster and the regular delegation of Douglas eliminating C. J. Campbell of the driers of the nation in the recent war regulars, secretary of the state cen-

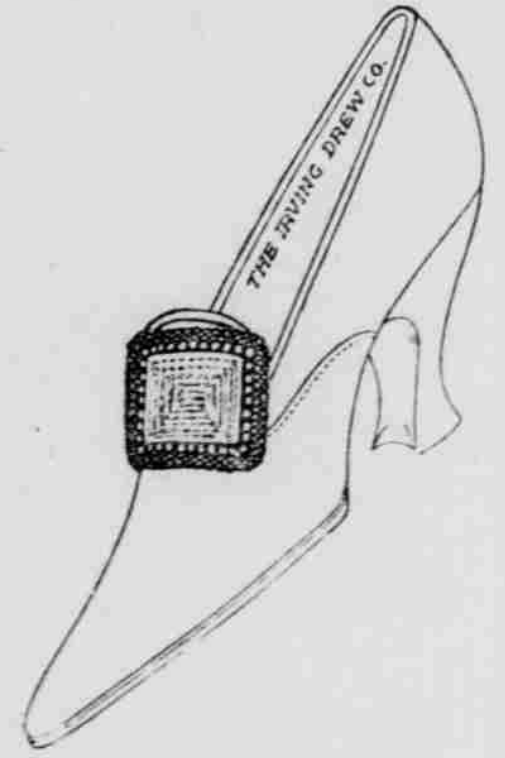
