BILL PLACES IRELAND UNDER MARTIAL LAW

Military Courts Will Supersede Crown Tribunals and Duties of Coroners.

London, Aug. 2.—Duties of crown tribunals in Ireland will be taken over by courts martial, even to the extent of settling civil disputes, infliction of fines and the binding of accused persons over to keep the peace under the terms of the new Irish bill, which was made public this morning.

Military courts also will take over the duties of coroners and will have the power to decide cases without jury. In trials for crimes punishable by death, however, one person, who need not be an officer, shall sit as one of the judges. He must be approved by the lord chancellor of Ireland or the lord chief justice of England.

Persons convicted by them may be imprisoned in any part of Great Britain.

The bill makes provision for excluding Ulster from the working of the law by stipulating that it shall be effective in the whole or any part of Ireland.

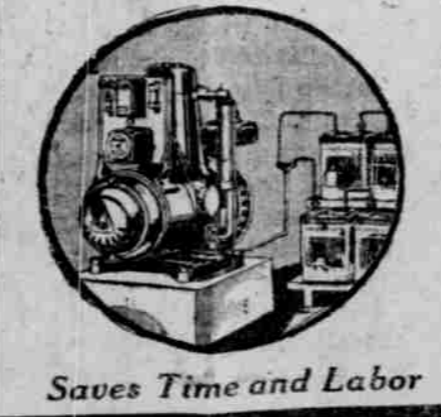

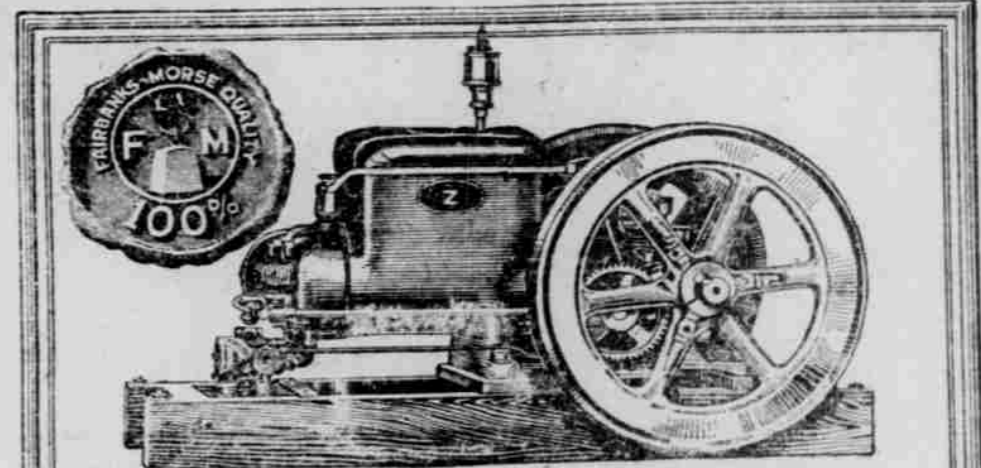
