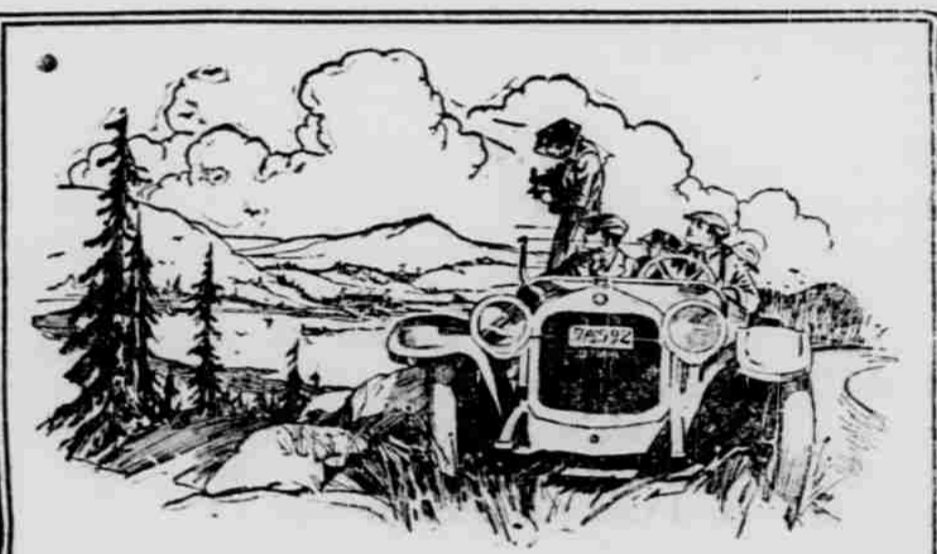
Attended Christening Ceremonies

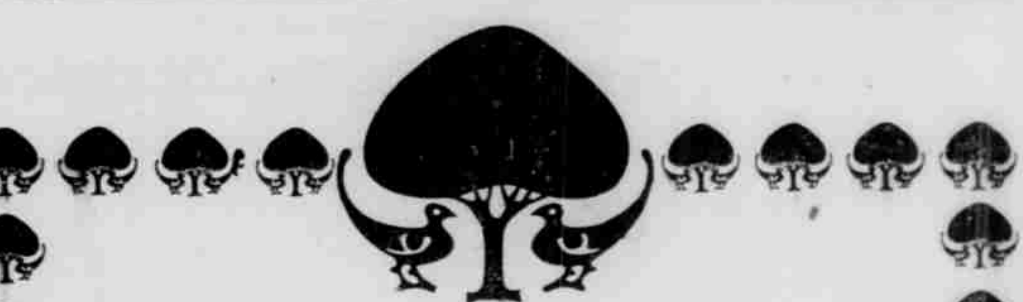
