PLANS MADE FOR THIS IMPROVEMENT IN THOROUGHFARE AT AN EARLY DATE.

The improvement of the road leading to the Missouri river ferry is a matter that has long been under discussion and the present plan points to making it one of the best in and near the city. This highway is the chief means of travel to and from Nebraska and Iowa and during the summer season when the road was in possible shape was well traveled by auto parties and persons coming to this city to trade.
