Late today he spoke to a large crowd at Lincoln in the Auditorium and an overflow gathering outside. During the trip from the Wyoming line he made eight rear platform talks through the Platte

Here and at Lincoln the governor expanded on his charges that the "reactionary" press was biased. He declared today that there was a deliberate and corrupt purpose to keep the facts from the people" and, referring to republican contributions coming, he said, from "big business" he declared there was an "attempt to buy up newspapers everywhere,'
